Farm Products' Prices Up

WASHINGTON, AP—Prices of farm products, ending a seven-month decline, rose about two percent in the month prior to October 15, the agriculture department reports.

Cotton and dairy products showed the biggest price advance, and there were declines for cattle, fruit, chickens, corn and wool.

Prices received by farmers October 15 were reported at 236 percent of the 1910-1914 average. A month earlier they stood at 231 percent. The record level of 313 percent of the 1910-1914 average was set last February.

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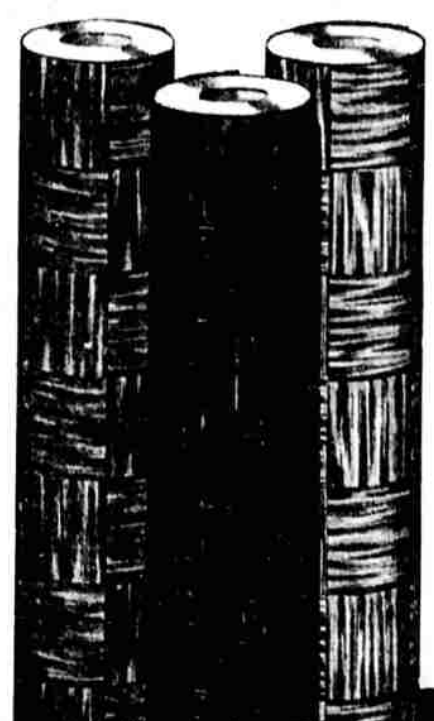
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
