

Tebbetts Ridicules Dresen

BOSTON, (AP)—Mgr. Charlie Dresen of the Brooklyn Dodgers was cited as the object of the ill feeling of "major league baseball players" last night by George (Birdie) Tebbetts, Cleveland Indian catcher.

"We all were glad when Dresen blew the National league pennant in the playoff series with the New York Giants," Tebbetts said in a speech before 1000 members of Massachusetts association of insurance agents.

"Dresen showed lack of sympathy and understanding for his players, as well as poor sportsmanship several times during the past season," Tebbetts explained. Birdie is engaged in the insurance business in Manchester, N.H., during the off-season.

Dresen was not available for comment.

Leo Durocher, on the other hand, always gave full credit to his New York Giants players during their amazing pennant drive. Tebbetts said. "But Dresen accused his rookie pitcher, Ery Palou of being a 'gutless' after he returned in a poor game while worrying about his sick wife and his high blood pressure disclosed by an army physical examination."

Dresen, reached at his home in Los Angeles, at first declined to comment on Tebbetts' speech. Then, reconsidering, he told a newsman: "You can say that he doesn't know what he's talking about. Those things are not true."

DICK KAZMAIER Back of Week

Kazmaier AP Back Of Week

NEW YORK, (AP)—Dick Kazmaier, 20-year old Princeton All-American from Maumee, Ohio, had another accolade bestowed on his slender shoulders today when he was named the football Back of the Week.

Hailed as one of the greatest of offensive performers in Princeton's gridiron history, Kazmaier won the weekly Associated Press poll after leading the Tigers to a 23-15 victory over Cornell for their 18th successive victory.

Here's what Kazmaier did to win the honors: Completed 15 of 17 passes, three for touchdowns.

Scored two touchdowns.

Gained 200 yards through the air. Carried the ball 18 times for 126 yards.

INSPIRATION But probably the most important of all was the inspiration he gave his Tiger teammates when the going was tough during the early part of the game.

From a 7-6 lead at the end of the first quarter, Princeton took a 20-6 advantage at the half and then turned the game into a rout.

Nine other players were nominated at least once for top honors among the backs.

The list: Gary Kerkorian, Stanford — His excellent generalship and coolness in tight situations largely were responsible for Stanford's 14-7 victory over Washington. He also completed 12 passes for 160 yards, one on a fourth down for a touchdown, and kicked two conversions.

Ray McKown, Texas Christian — Passed 74 and five yards for two touchdowns against Southern California, scored one himself, engineered a 82-yard run for another, rushed 70 yards in 20 carries and completed 17 out of 25 passes for 270 yards.

Ollie Matson, San Francisco — His fine running against a strong San Diego Navy team made him one of top ground gainers in country.

Johnny Karras, Illinois — Scored three touchdowns, one an 80-yard gallop, against Indiana.

Billy Tidwell, Texas A&M — Jack Scarbath, Maryland; Tauricella, Tennessee; Eddie Crowder, Oklahoma, and Junior Arterburn, Texas Tech.

Babers Nation's Leading Passer STILLWATER, Okla., (AP)—Don Babers, an unknown sophomore defensive back from Oklahoma A&M six weeks ago, was leading the nation in passing today.

He emerged from the weekend's firing with the most completions—91—and the most aeriels—192 for 1105 yards and a 36.5 percentage.

Bears Top Coast on Offense

LOS ANGELES, (AP) California leads the Pacific Coast conference in total offense, and next in line is Washington State.

California has gained 1851 yards rushing and 702 passing for 2556 yards total. Washington State has made 1528 rushing and 746 passing for 2274 yards.

Thanks to fullback Johnny Olszewski, California leads in rushing, with Washington State next, while Oregon tops the list in passing, with 1038 yards. Washington's passing is second, with a figure of 909.

Southern California is the top defensive team on rushing, holding opponents to 741 yards net and an average of 105.9 per game. Best

pass defensive team is Stanford, with 540 yards and a 90.0 average. Washington fullback Hugh McElhenny leads the conference in scoring with 10 touchdowns and 14 conversions for 74 points, while Stanford quarterback Gerry Kerkorian is the PCC's number one total gainer on offense.

Kerkorian has passed for 808 yards and gained 54 yards on the ground. The total yardage of 862 is 46 more than Paul Cameron of UCLA, who led the league last week.

California fullback Johnny Olszewski leads in rushing, with 383 yards in 77 carries, for an average of 7.6, and Bill McCall of Stan-

ford heads the pass receivers, with 25 for 386 yards and five touchdowns.

Illinois Would Bar Joe Louis If Bomber Attempts Comeback

CHICAGO, (AP)—If Joe Louis decides to hit another comeback trail he will have to detour Illinois. The Illinois Athletic Commission will deny him permission to fight in this state, for his own well being.

Chairman Joe Triner said Louis "should not take chances of being hurt... he's been a great part of the game, but he should quit before it's too late."

"If Louis continues to fight, and if he ever applies for a license to fight in Illinois, it will be denied for his own good."

Commissioner Lou Radzienda and Ralph Metcalfe agree. "If Louis does not retire of his own accord, the National Boxing Association should retire him for his own sake," said Radzienda. "I am suggesting this in a letter to Dave Rochon (NBA president) in Montreal."

Radzienda is a member of the committee. Triner is a member of the NBA executive committee. The 37-year-old former heavy-weight king, belted through the ropes by Rocky Marciano in Madison Square Garden Friday night, has not announced retirement plans.

His attorney, Truman Gibson, secretary of the International Boxing Club, said he did not believe Louis would try another comeback.

"Judging from what Joe has told me, I am reasonably sure he has no plans for future fights," Gibson observed. "I talked with Marshall Miles (Louis' manager) and he said there were no plans for Louis to continue fighting—that Louis was through."
