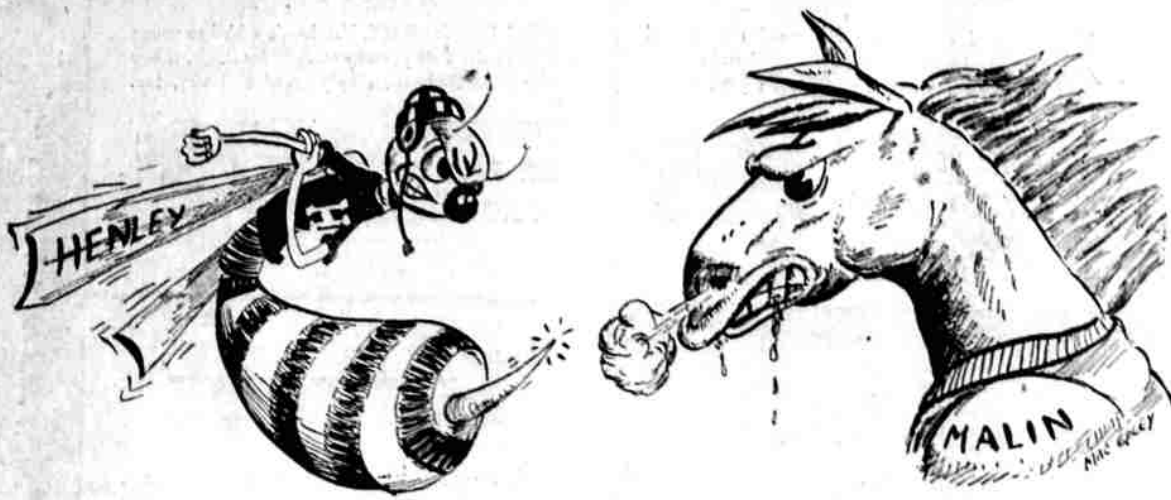


## Hornets, Mustangs Ready for Big Effort



## Henley, Malin Await Kickoff

### Teams In Title Go Saturday

All the blue chips in the Klamath county Class B football league are in the pot—and the loop's two unbeaten teams are ready to cash in for the title in a showdown battle Saturday afternoon.

The title grid clash sends Henley's Hornets against Malin's Mustangs. Kickoff time is 2 p.m. on the Henley turf.

The game is rated a close toss-up, although the Hornets were slim pre-season favorites.

#### FAST BACKS

Both boast fast backfields and strong lines.

If there is any favorite it would be Henley with deeper reserve power.

But there is no accurate gauge of Malin's power because the Mustangs have scored such convincing victories this season that freshmen and sophomores have seen more action than the junior and senior regulars.

Henley's starting backfield will probably have John Lehto at quarterback, Jim DeVore and Cecil Enman at halfbacks and Gordon Ramsey at fullback.

Malin will open with quarterback Andy Travis, halfbacks Arby Paris and Gene Evans and fullback Rod Ottomann.

Henley beat Sacred Heart, 32-19; Malin won over the Trojans, 34-7; The Hornets waxed Merrill, 44-13; the Mustangs posted a 32-14 victory against the Huskies; Henley was handed a scare against Chiloquin, but won 32-24; Malin blanked the Panthers in an early-season game, 20-0. Henley beat Bonanza, 19-6; the Antlers forfeited to Malin.

The prize for the winner is a Dist. 5-B game with Phoenix, the winner of this one earning a place in the state playoffs.

## Robinson 'Bats' for Dressen

### Tebbetts' Remarks Irk Jackie

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., (AP)—Jackie Robinson doesn't like that blast Birdie Tebbetts put on Brooklyn Manager Chuck Dressen in the Ery Palica case.

Dressen publicly charged Palica with being glib and Tebbetts, Cleveland Indians catcher, yesterday criticized him for it.

"Did Tebbetts ever play for Dressen?" Robinson, Brooklyn second baseman in San Antonio on a barnstorming tour, asked. "Of course, Tebbetts didn't. If he had played for him, Tebbetts never would have talked like he did."

Tebbetts said in Boston yesterday that "we all were glad when Dressen blew the National league pennant in the playoff series with the New York Giants. Dressen showed lack of sympathy and understanding for his players as well as poor sportsmanship several times during the past season."

But Robinson declared that Dressen tried every other method to bring Palica back to his 1950 ability. "All our players knew Dressen was doing all he could to help Palica, and our players—who should know the inside dope—feel that Dressen was right. We like him. We think Dressen is a good manager, and if you want to find out about a manager go to his players, but don't take the word of an outsider."

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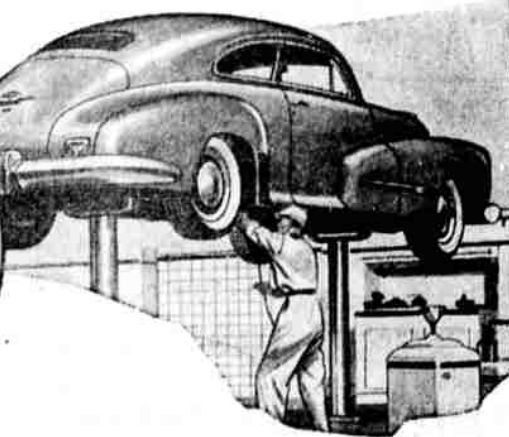
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### WITTE GETS STARTING CALL
