

Campanella Gets NL 'Most Valuable' Nod

NEW YORK, (AP)—Roy Campanella will always remember 1951. Throughout the year the Brooklyn Dodgers were hampered by injuries, but now Campanella has reaped the fruits of his labors. He was named yesterday as the National league's most valuable player for the past season by a 25-man committee of the baseball writers' association of America. Campanella is only the third catcher since 1931 to win the coveted award. The other receivers to gain the honor were Gabby Hartnett of the 1935 Chicago Cubs and Ernie Lombardi of the 1938 Cincinnati Reds.
The 29-year-old Dodger star collected 243 points out of a possible 336 to win in a breeze. Stan Musial

"I had forgotten all about that award," he said. "After we were beaten in the playoff by the New York Giants, I just didn't think about it any more."
"I surely am happy about it now. I gave my best and I surely am grateful to the baseball writers association for voting me in."
Campanella's selection marked the sixth time since 1931 that a player not on a pennant winner on the field. The others were Chuck Klein, Philadelphia, 1932; Ducky Medwick, St. Louis, 1937; Lombardi, Cincinnati, 1938; Boe Elliott, Boston, 1947 and Musial, St. Louis, 1948.
The star backstop drew 11 first place votes while Musial, only player named on every ballot, collected two. Trailing Musial were Monte Irvin, New York, third, Sal Maglie, New York, fourth, Preacher Roe, Brooklyn, fifth, Jackie Robinson, Brooklyn, sixth, Rickie Ashburn, Philadelphia, seventh, Bobby Thomson, New York, eighth, Murry Dickson, Pittsburgh, ninth and Ralph Kiner, Pittsburgh, tenth.
Some 58 players received votes of honorable mention but Jim Konstanty, Philadelphia's relief pitcher and the 1950 winner failed to draw either a vote or honorable mention. Campanella enjoyed a great season despite his series of injuries. The collapse of the Dodgers who

Joe Louis Asks 'Time'

NEW YORK, (AP)—Admitting that he has come to "a turn in the road," ex-heavyweight champion Joe Louis wants more time to think over his future plans.

Louis issued a statement yesterday—apparently prompted by the action of the Illinois Athletic Commission which said it would not permit him to fight in that state—asking the public to "bear with me while I think out my future plans."

The statement said nothing about retiring, a move which has been predicted freely by those close to the old Brown Bomber after his knockout by Rocky Marciano last week. They still think, though, that he never will fight again.

"Many people," he said "undoubtedly kindly disposed and in all good will, have had varied opinions of my future."

But, he said he would make no definite announcement until his return from an exhibition tour of Japan. He is scheduled to leave for Seattle on the first leg of the trip on Nov. 10.
