Writer Sues Milton Berle

NEW YORK (AP)—A woman ghost-writer is suing comedian Milton Berle for \$250,000, charging he scrapped a serious novel she wrote for him, out of deference to his former wife.

The writer, Anita Roddy-Eden, brought the damage suit in state supreme court yesterday.

She says Berle withdrew the book, "The Kneeling God," after his former wife, actress Joyce Matthews, slashed her wrists in the bathroom of showman Billy Rose's apartment.

A previously written episode in the book had the heroine committing suicide in a bathroom.

Miss Roddy-Eden said she and Berle had agreed to share equally in the book's profits, which she estimates would have amounted to a quarter of a million dollars. Berle has 20 days in which to answer the suit.

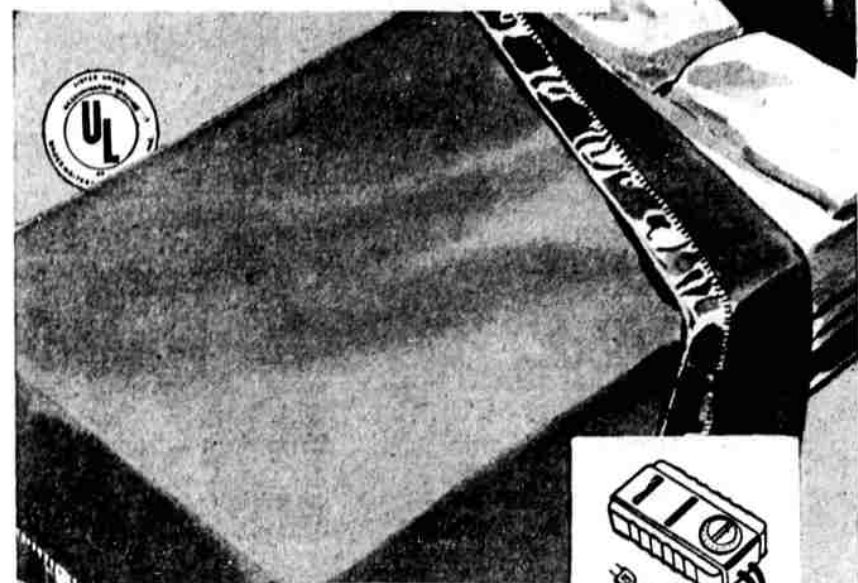

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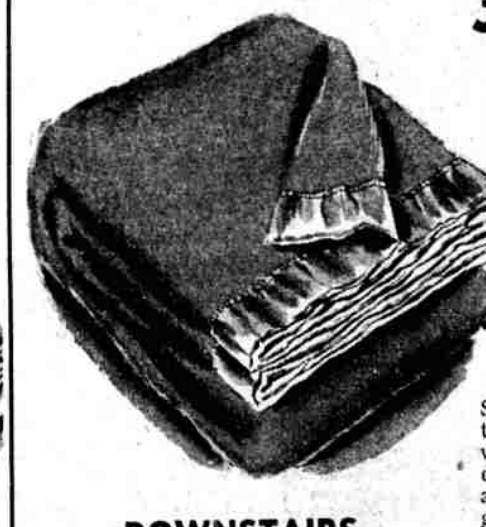
