Slot 'Rhythm Boys' Freed

MONTESANO, Wash. (AP)—Aberdeen's charges against three slot machine "rhythm boys" were dismissed in superior court yesterday. Judge Warner Poyhonen set aside the Aberdeen police court convictions of Robert E. Black, John J. Foster and John H. Pugh on disorderly person charges. Fines of \$100 each were ordered returned. The judge acted after Lester T. Parker, Aberdeen corporation counsel, filed a motion for dismissal, saying he doubted there was sufficient evidence to sustain the September 14 convictions from which the trio had appealed. The three, who claim their rhythm system of pulling slot machine arms makes the devices pay off, were arrested in Aberdeen clubs. They gained attention previously by their success against slot machine jackpots at Lewiston.

Gable Court Battle Shapes

SANTA MONICA, (AP)—Clark Gable's lawyer said that the actor's divorce battle with Lady Sylvia Ashley will be waged in the California courts. Gable has been forbidden from obtaining a Nevada divorce by a court injunction issued here yesterday. The injunction was ordered despite Gable's contention that he now is a legal resident of Nevada. Mrs. Gable has filed for divorce in California. Gable has answered her suit, and recently filed an action of his own in Las Vegas. Both charge cruelty. Superior Judge Orlando Rhodes said that if Gable disregards the injunction and obtains a Nevada divorce anyway, he will be liable for contempt of court charges in California. Gable's attorney, W. I. Gilbert Jr., said the ruling means "we will scrap it out right here." The injunction was sought originally under a new and untested divorce law which forbids "quickie" divorces in other states for California residents. Gilbert had countered with claims that Gable is negotiating to buy a Nevada cattle ranch, has Nevada plates on his car, and is even paying a Nevada poll tax. Judge Rhodes felt that Gable submitted to the jurisdiction of California courts when he answered Lady Sylvia's suit here.

Hollywood Jig-Saw Puzzle Movie Making Fools Russ

HOLLYWOOD, (RE)—Exclusive: You: Scenes for a Hollywood movie satire on communism were filmed in the Russian zone of Vienna, it now can be told, and there will be red faces on the Reds when the word gets around in the Kremlin. Viteca Lindfors and a camera crew invaded the Red zone for three hours this summer for a sequence in the anti-Communist film, "No Time for Flowers." Producer Mort Brakin and his associate, Maurie Brees, who made the film in Vienna's British and U.S. zones, unspooled their lips about fooling the Russians now that the film's negative is safe in Hollywood. "The Russians," Brees said, "never did discover that we were making anti-Communist film because of the way we broke down the script in jig-saw puzzle. We shot the few scenes we needed in the Red zone and got out fast." Trunk Murder Case Solved

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—A lady's curiosity was credited today with solving the East Los Angeles trunk murder. A slender, nervous house painter named John Kelley admitted to deputy sheriffs Thursday they announced that he strangled his 39-year-old wife, Margaret, during an argument last October 13 over money and another woman. Inspector Garner Brown said Kelley, 44, went out a story of how he stuffed the body never knowing it was there. He said he told them she had gone to Boston, where their grandfather was dying. In his statement, taken down by a stenographer, Kelley said he finally dumped the trunk at night in a nearby vacant lot after the children had complained of a strange odor. Mrs. Hattie Bell McParlan, 72, had read about the slaying in the newspapers. Not seeing Mrs. Kelley around the house for 10 days made her suspicious, so she called the authorities. Copco Seeks Higher Rate

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—An annual rate increase of \$397,449 is being sought by the California Oregon Power Co. from 75,000 customers in Oregon and California. The company Thursday asked the California public utilities commission to approve a \$15.82 increase for residents of Siskiyou, Modoc, Trinity, Shasta and the northern half of Del Norte counties in Northern California. The company said it is also asking the Oregon Power commission for a \$201,422 increase for customers it serves in southern Oregon. Earlier applications were filed in Oregon and California for increases totaling \$1,043,000 annually but were withdrawn last month.

Trucker Held In Swindle

PORTLAND, (AP)—A baking company truck driver admitted Thursday he had swindled Portland grocers out of about \$100 weekly for the past five years, police said. That would amount to about \$25,000, Det. Capt. William Browne reported. Orville P. Bailey, 33, the driver, was arrested after a grocer got wondering why his bakery goods profits were so small. The grocer, William Linden, went to police. In turn, two detectives visited Linden's store and checked his pastry stock. They checked again after Bailey made his delivery. The driver collected \$28 from Linden, but left only \$10.28 worth of supplies, Browne said the detectives found. Another store was checked. It had 76 fruit cakes, Bailey appeared and collected for 10 cakes, but a count showed he had left none. Bailey admitted the swindle in a signed statement. Browne said, and was held under \$3000 bail.

County Forest Fund Greater

Klamath county will receive approximately \$328,080 as its share of national forest receipts for the 1951 fiscal year ending June 30, according to Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone. This doubles last year's take in receipts, with timber sales providing the largest share of income. Grants and land use revenues provided the balance. Twenty-five percent of all national forest receipts are distributed to counties in proportion to the amount of national forestland contained within their boundaries. Oregon counties will receive approximately \$4,291,000 (M) this year, with all such county revenues tabbed for use in roads and schools.
