In Britain wages are poor and taxes are high, for example 65 percent of the income of an individual is withheld before he ever gets his pay check. There is a 50 percent sales tax on radios and 100 percent tax on cars.

In closing Miss Perry stressed that Britishers are stifled by dissatisfaction and misunderstanding in the Labor party, and that in this country, our prayer for government should be that of intelligence and integrity.
