

FOUR MORE REACH PLAYOFFS

Roosevelt Stalled By Lights

Four more teams climbed into the Oregon high school football playoffs yesterday and last night. Another missed by just 3 minutes and 10 seconds when the lights went out.

The newest qualifiers are Grant of Portland, Hillsboro, North Marion and Canby.

The blackout occurred in the final minutes of a game in which Roosevelt, rated No. 2 in the Associated Press poll of sportswriters and sportscasters around the state, was leading Lincoln, 26-12.

A transformer failed, and the game could not be resumed in the darkness. Lincoln Coach Jerry Peil refused to concede the game to Roosevelt, although the Teddies had a first down on their own 43-yard line. A conference of school officials is scheduled for Monday to decide what is to be done.

In Division A-2, North Marion clinched the Dist. 3 title, although its perfect record was marred by a 20-20 tie with Central Union of Monmouth Independent.

Canby clinched the Dist. 4 crown with a convincing 19-0 win over Sandy.

In Dist. 1, previously undefeated, United Rainier was played to a 14-14 tie by Vernonia, once beaten in league play. Rainier will meet Columbia Prep of Portland next weekend for the district championship.

Grants Pass, No. 1 in the AP poll since the start of the season, justified its rating by cutting down Roseburg, 63-0. Grants Pass already has clinched a play-off berth as A-1 Dist. 6 champion. It was Grants Pass 16th straight win.

ASTORIA WIN
Astoria, which clinched the A-1 Dist. 3 title last week, travelled to North Bend to give its hosts a 20-0 beating. Astoria is ranked No. 4 in the AP poll.

Eugene, conqueror of the Dist. 5 leader, Marshfield, last Saturday, leveled Salem, a leading Dist. 8 team, 21-13. Eugene, rated the state's No. 9 team, has no chance to get into the play-off, however, since it refused to schedule a sufficient number of Dist. 5 teams.

Marshfield plays Coquille, once beaten but winner of the A-2 district 6 title, tonight. Marshfield is ranked No. 7.

THE DIST. 8 favorite, unbeaten, United Milwau-Freewater, was idle this weekend. Milwau-Freewater is No. 6 in the AP poll.

Toledo, the A-2 Dist. 2 leader, went through its 22nd game without a loss when it defeated Salem Bible Academy, 34-0.

University High of Eugene had nailed down the Dist. 5 title with a win over Dayton Thursday.

Prineville, the Dist. 8 A-2 leader, risks its undefeated, untied record in a game with Columbia Prep at Portland this afternoon.

British Waxed In Cup Play

PINEHURST, N.C. — The grip Uncle Sam's golfing nephews have retained on the Ryder Cup for the past 16 years was considerably firmer today as the cream of America's professional crop massed a 3-1 lead over Britain's best opening foursome play.

With play suspended today to avoid conflict with college football, the United States team needed only a split in tomorrow's eight singles matches to retain the cup. It has held since 1935 in this biennial competition.

MIST, RAIN
The weather man came up with one of his worst days yesterday and the experts figured that the British would be more at home in the cold, wet going. Morning mist turned into a steady rain for the afternoon rounds, but the Americans, to prove they were masters of the elements as well as the opposition.

It took a surprising 2 and 1 victory by Charles Ward and Arthur Lees over Henry Hanson of St. Andrews, Ill., and Ed "Porty" Oliver Seattle to give the confident invaders their only victory and prevent a shutout. The more highly rated English tandem ran into some super shingling and none was able to last beyond the 15th hole of the afternoon round.

THREE WINS
Capt. Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., and Lloyd Mangrum of Niles, Ill., dealt a 5 and 4 trouncing to Jimmy Adams and John Panton. National Open champion Ben Hogan of Port Worth and Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., prevailed by the same score against Fred Daly and Ken Bousfield, and Clayton Balfour, burly Charlotte, N.C., pro, and Jackie Burke, of Houston, at 28, the baby of the matches, gauged up on Britain's Open champion Max Faulkner and David (Dai) Rex 5 and 3.

Thus it is that the British who came here with what Arthur Lacey, non-playing captain, described as the best team they had ever sent to this country, find themselves on the verge of another setback, their seventh in nine Cup contests.

County Tilt In Gridlight

The local football spotlight focused this afternoon on the Herbie vs. Bend game at the Herbie and Main Mustangs kicked off at 1:30 in a Klamath county championship game.

The winner meets the Phoenix Pirates for the Dist. 5 title. The Oregon Tech Owls are in Portland where they mixed this afternoon with the Vanport Vikings in an Oregon Collegiate conference game.

The Klamath Pelicans are idle until November 12 when they travel to Bend to meet the Lava Bears in the last game of the season for the local high school eleven.

Prep Gridiron Pressure Runs Rat Race With College Brand

NEW YORK (NEA)—So you think pressure football in the colleges is a rat race, eh?

Well, then, you ought to dig into it in the high schools. There, too, everything is done to hide the facts and figures from the public. Those who attend the games have not the slightest conception of how bad things are.

Hurdling many an obstacle, the coach of a high school playing steamed-up football must turn out a winner regardless, even more so than at most colleges.

The coach of one of the superior teams in the coal belt and the swift Pennsylvania league appeals for help that he is sure all high school coaches would welcome. Naturally, he does not want his name used because he would be fired immediately.

This coach lists only a few of the things with which he and his boys have to contend.

It's mighty serious, for he lists gambling as number one.

Coaches and their families are threatened when the team loses. Coaches and players actually have been beaten up for losing.

Down town clubs and other organizations associated with high school football are more demanding than the most rabid college alumni, real or synthetic.

To collect fat guarantees, school boards schedule games away out of the class of their enrollment.

All games are played at night, the youngsters arriving home sometimes as late as 3 a.m. That's just fine for a growing boy.

The political set-up of school boards and their dictating of the athletic policy is a constant headache to coaches.

Parental interference is mighty annoying.

School administrators do not give coaches time to properly prepare their teams for games. Coaches are unable to obtain the tools with which to work for better coaching.

FIGHT SCOUTS
High school coaches spend half their time fighting off college scouts making propositions to their stars, and frequently spoiling them.

High school coaches must be in school the entire day teaching.

The pay of practically all high school coaches is \$1.10 per hour. Teams play to \$5,000 and \$5,000 a season.

Washington High of Massillon, O., played to 152,000 people in 10 games last fall, outdrew every college in the state save Ohio State and maybe Cincinnati.

Most high school coaches get only a one-year coaching contract. Their teaching, of course, is under state tenure.

This coach from the anthracite area isn't beefing because of his own situation. He speaks for the boys and his profession.

Coaches of colleges playing pressure football at least are well paid and the hired hands well taken care of.

In that, and every other sense, the high school pressure football business is deplorable.

Six Intersectionals Top Grid Card Today

NEW YORK, (U)—Football fans, who have watched most of their gridiron sport this fall in rainy weather, donned woolies, raincoats and other bad-weather clothing today for a nationwide card headed by six intersectionals contests.

The weatherman predicted most of today's games would be played in poor weather, ranging from chilly temperatures in usually warm climates to rain and snow. The snow forecast was not confined to the northern areas. It also reached down into the southland.

LIKED WEATHER
The underdogs liked the weather prospects. They figured poor playing conditions would enhance their chances of making the football season a little more topsy turvy than it has been this fall.

The most traditional of the intersectional games, matching the Navy and Notre Dame before some 44,000 fans at Baltimore, faced prospects of a cold rain. That was all right for Coach Eddie Erdtatz of the Middles, who considered the rain an equalizer.

This series has been going on for more than two decades but only four times have the Middles faced the Rose Bowl-bound Trojans of Southern California in New York's Yankee Stadium, where an all-night rain pelted the gridiron.

Pittsburgh journeyed to Texas to meet Rice, Missouri brought its much-talked about spread formation East for a test against Indiana's Big Ten champion, and Minnesota visited Philadelphia for a clash against Pennsylvania and Penn state met an injury-riddled Purdue eleven at Lafayette in the other top intersectional affairs.

Although its usually the intersectional games that take the spotlight, there was enough going on within the various conference circles to furnish plenty of interesting football.

NUMBER ONE
No. 1 among the family squabbles was the game between undefeated Illinois and Michigan, the Big Ten champion which hasn't been beaten inside the circuit since 1937. Some 71,000 fans were expected at Champaign to see if the Wolverines could stop the Illini's Johnny Karras from equalling the immortal Red Grange's record of 13 touchdowns in one season. Karras needed three to do so.

Other Big Ten contests matched Wisconsin's potent defense against Indiana, Ohio State against once-beaten Northwestern and Minnesota against Iowa.

TOP TEAM
The South offered two inter-conference games as its chief attractions with Tennessee, the nation's No. 1 team, from the Southeastern loop, at North Carolina, and Duke of the Southern circuit at Georgia Tech, also undefeated.

The Southwest again presented an unpredictable lineup. Texas and Southern Methodist clashed in another contest and the Texas Angies were at Arkansas.

STAY HOME
While Southern California was in the East attempting to uphold the prestige of the Pacific Coast conference, other members of the league battled away in neighborhood games. Stanford, with an untarnished record, entertained Washington State, California played UCLA, and Oregon State met Washington.

In the East Princeton, seeking its 19th successive win, sent America Dick Kazmierer against Cornell, Dartmouth, with Columbia at Bates, Brown at Yale, Colgate at Holy Cross and Fordham at Rutgers in other major contests.

The Bremerton, Wash., lad topped the nation's collegiate passers last year and was named quarterback on the Associated Press All-American eleven.
