Malin Eyes District Title

Mustangs Kick Henley To Cop Championship

The Malin Mustangs have a Klamath county football title tucked away in their showcase and now they're looking for bigger prizes—the Dist. 5 Class B crown, then the state bauble.

It's a long road ahead but Jim Courtois, coach of the Mustangs, is confident they can make it. They took the sting out of the Henley Hornets Saturday by a 31-6 count.

The Klamath county title battle, on paper a loss-up became a rout as Malin displayed a ground attack with a purpose and a radar-active aerial game that completely befuddled Jim Porter's highly-rated Hornets on their own field in full view of hundreds of standing fans.

ROUTE

The Mustangs kicked off suddenly with two touchdowns in the first quarter on the ground, then took to the air in the last frame to turn the game into a rout with three scores.

Only the jitter-bug legs of a substitute back, Wilbur Harnsberger, prevented a whitewash. With most of the fans heading for their cars, Harnsberger took off on a 62-yard scamper with less than a minute to go. He crossed the goal to give Henley fans their only excuse for cheering all afternoon.

STALL HENLEY

The tenacious Mustang line stalled Henley's running attack in the first half and only once did Henley touch Malin territory, then just two yards past midfield.

After an exchange of punts in the first quarter, Malin scored in six plays with Arby Paris covering the last 35 yards on reverse play. But a clipping penalty called the play back and the Mustangs started over again from the Henley 33. Red Ottomani sprinted to the 25, then Rob Stevenson caught the Henley defense napping and went all the way on an end-around scamper.

On the second play after the end-around kickoff, Henley bobbled and Red Ottomani recovered and Henley recovered for Malin on Henley's 32.

Eight plays later—even though set back by two penalties—Stevenson crossed up Henley with the line play with the Hornets looking for a line smash on the one-yard line. Stevenson took the hand-

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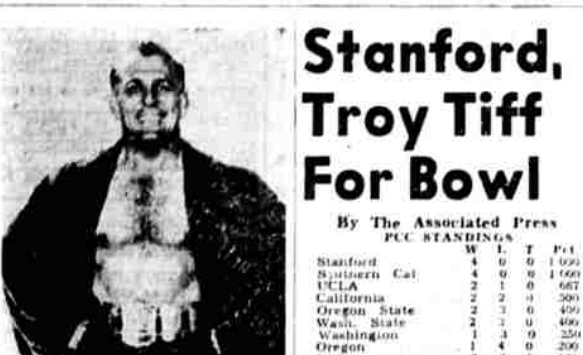

The Pacific Coast conference's northern division teams had the field all to themselves today—they were solidly grouped on the bottom of the standings.

None has a smidgen of a chance at Rose Bowl attendance except by buying a ticket.

But out of the race for consolation honors came a new hero, Oregon State rose and upset the favored University of Washington eleven, 49-14, dunning even the vaunted Husky offense.

Stanford, in holding the Stanford Indians to a 21-13 victory.

The loss by WSC handed the key to the Rose Bowl to Stanford, provided they can take the packlock away from University of Southern California next Saturday at Los Angeles. Even if they weren't close to Hollywood, that game could be billed as the season's super-colossal epic, although nobody but nobody expected it would come to this when the season opened.

LAURELS

Oregon State recaptured a considerable chunk of laurel in Saturday's walloping handed the Huskies at Seattle. The Beavers bottled up the vaunted Husky offense, then pushed them all over the field with a ground attack that couldn't be stopped.

Fullback Sam Baker scored three of the OSC TDs. With help from Baker's scurrying feet the Beavers piled up 396 on the ground.

It was the fourth straight loss for Washington.

The Cougars tossed a first rate scare into the Indians before dropping the game at Palo Alto.

A couple of Argentinians by the name of Gary Kerkerian and Harry Huggins passed and ran, respectively, the Indians to a touchdown during each of the first three quarters and what looked like a clear-cut win.

Then Washington State uncorked two touchdowns in the fourth quarter that set some Indian hair on end. But it was too little and too late.

Oregon dug its way out of the league cellar in a transposition with Idaho, nosing out the Vandals 14-13 at Eugene on a last-minute touchdown pass by George Shaw.

This week the cellar-circuit members have some more tough meat to chew on. Oregon State hosts UCLA, Washington meets California at Berkeley, Washington State has a breather with Idaho at Moscow and Oregon ducks East for an intersectional tilt with Boston University.

Quarterback Querino Lelli added two more tallies in the second period, after recovered fumble with sneaks from the one-yard line, then the two-yard stripe.

The Owls let George Clark loose in the fourth quarter as they did against Centralia and the El Paso, Tex., lad came through again.

Probably the most under-rated back on the Owlie squad, Clark is proving his worth. He rambled for Oretch's fourth score in the last period, scampering 30 yards to the end zone.

Vanport's lone tally came in the third quarter when Dale Stewart plunged over from the five-yard line.

The Owls will dish up a real non-league thriller for local fans Friday night on Modoc Field. Weber College of Ogden, Utah, will bring its squad in to test the Owls.

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The Wildcats, 13-12 losers to Boise Junior college, will offer a real test for the Owls before the season closing league tilt with Eastern Oregon the following week on Modoc Field in Oretch's homecoming.

The Owls dropped a 14-6 decision to the Broncos.

Oregon College of Education won the Oregon Collegiate conference title and remained the only unbeaten college team in Oregon by virtue of its 47-14 victory of Eastern Oregon college of Education in a football game at McMinnville Saturday.

Oregon Tech won its first conference game of the season when it rolled over Vanport 27-7 at Portland.

OCE opened its scoring on a 23 yard pass from LeRoy Coleman to end Lyle Hay. After that Bill Palmquist, Leroy Vanover, Ray Hubbard, Bud Michaels, Chuck Pinion and George McGreer scored touchdowns. Roger Dasch kicked four extra points and passed to Allen Poyer for the other.

Jim McAlister passed to Wes Ball for OCE's second period tally. Glen Wendler intercepted an OCE pass on the five and went over for the other EOC touchdown.

Jim McIntosh opened Oregon Tech's scoring with a 80-yard first quarter touchdown run. Then Querino Lelli scored twice and George Clark tallied for OTI.

Vanport's only score came in the third quarter when Stan Hays took a 15-yard pass from Dale Stewart and ran five yards.

Britain's Laced In Cup Play

PINEHURST, N. C. (AP)—The craning job Arthur Lacey, non-playing captain of Great Britain's Ryder Cup golf team, had hoped to have done on the International trophy has been postponed.

Uncle Sam's professionals saw to that yesterday when they ran off with six of the eight singles matches and tied another to clinch the two-day competition by a 9½ to 2½ score, second highest margin since Cup play began in 1927.

When the English arrived in this country two weeks ago Lacey said they had brought the best-balanced, finest conditioned squad ever to cross the Atlantic. This was to be the year they'd break the 16-year spell the Americans had held over them in this biennial test.

SNEAD SPARKS

Snead handed Pinehurst country club's 700-yard course's par 72 a five stroke lacing with a morning 67 shoot, four holes ahead of Max Faulkner, British open title-holder. In the afternoon Sammy was one under for 15 holes to close out the match, 4 and 3.

Hopping on the band wagon for the United States were open champion Ben Hogan of Fort Worth, Jackie Burke of Houston, Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., Lloyd Mangrum of Miles, Ill., and Stewart (Skip) Alexander of Lexington, N. C.

Clayton Heafner of Charlotte, N. C., had to settle for a dead-heat with Fred Daly, 1947 British open champion and only Ed (Porky) Oliver of Seattle wound up a loser. Oliver, a last minute substitute for E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, who was stopped by a heavy cold, lost to Arthur Lees, 2 and 1.

It was Lees, teaming with Charles Ward, who gave the invaders their lone foursome victory over Oliver and Henry Ransom of St. Andrews, Ill.
