India Buys U.S. Tractors
NEW DELHI, (U)—India in 1950-51 bought from the United States 60 tractors with spare parts, agricultural implements and transport vehicles through the \$1,163,163 loan from the International Bank. It was officially announced.
During the preceding year, India obtained 180 tractors. The official source said these tractors by the end of 1951 would have brought 3,000,000 acres under cultivation, resulting in an estimated additional yield of 83,000 tons of additional food grains.
