Stork Arrives Early Again

SPOKANE, ID.—A young mother whose first baby was born in a police car yesterday gave birth to her second at the head of a hotel stairway.

"This can't happen again," said Mrs. E. K. Desjardis, 23, as she was carried from an apartment on a stretcher. But it did. With two policemen and an emergency hospital steward attending, she gave birth to a healthy baby boy.

Officer Warren Sullivan said the mother "turned on the tap—she radiated" when told it was a boy. The father, he said, "was in bad shape—very nervous."

Mrs. Desjardis said her baby girl was born in a police car just outside a Cleveland hospital.

Police Think Prof a Thief

SANTA BARBARA, Calif.—A 38-year-old sociology professor at Santa Barbara college was booked Wednesday on suspicion of burglary.

Sheriff John Ross said the dapper teacher's home contained rugs and other furnishings stolen from Montecito and Santa Barbara mansions in the past year.

Dr. Gwynne Mettler, 38, held in the county jail, denied the burglary charge and one of carrying a concealed weapon. Ross said he was arrested while swimming at the beach, and a revolver was found in his car.

Mettler is assistant professor of sociology at the college here, a branch of the University of California. The school said he also has taught at Pomona, Stanford, Portland, Ore., University, and the University of Washington.

Ross said the arrest climaxed a long investigation by his office and Santa Barbara police following a tip from a woman friend of the professor.

Last month he was elected a fellow of the division of personality and social psychology of the American Psychological association at its Chicago convention. In an interview several weeks ago with the Santa Barbara News-Press he remarked:

"One of the hard jobs in being a professional sociologist is that lots of people don't understand what we are up to."

Retail pork prices sagged this week and bargain hunters in some marketing areas may find items like hams or center cut pork chops reduced as much as 16 cents a pound.

But there was little change in other meats. Butter was up a cent or two in many places. And prices of many fresh vegetables rose moderately, reflecting lighter supplies and frost weather in shipping sections.

TREND

The drop in pork prices was a normal seasonal trend, given additional impetus this year by a big crop estimated at nearly 104 million animals—the biggest for any year since the record of 121 million in 1943. Market analysts say all indications point to port prices this winter, however, at just about the same level as last year.

A spot survey of week-end specials to be offered by stores in the most highly competitive areas shows pork loin cuts, fresh and smoked hams and chops predominating. Pork chop, for example, will be slashed 9 to 14 cents in several major cities across the country, and may go even lower next week.

Also being heavily promoted by major food retailers: roasting and frying chickens, veal stewing meat, canned soups and tomato juice.

Boneless beef brisket, better known in its corned beef form, advanced as much as 10 cents a pound in some places. The office of price stabilization allowed the boost, saying the former ceilings did not permit butchers enough profit on that item.

HIGHER

Colder weather and seasonal declines in supplies pushed carrots, celery, endive, escarole, radishes, cabbage, potatoes and spinach higher. Best lettuce advanced slightly, demand raised sweet potato prices.

Changes in fruits were less marked. The New York Fruit Auction Corp. said: "Fresh fruit ranks high on the list of essential foods and many varieties can be bought for less than 10 cents a pound, which is pretty cheap compared to the greater part of a dollar it takes to buy a pound of meat, a dozen eggs or a pound of butter."

The agriculture department headed cranberries as the week's most plentiful food for thrifty buying.

Wholesale food prices, as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet food index, declined slightly on average again this week to a new low for 1951. This index, totaling the wholesale cost on one pound each of 31 important foods, was at \$6.64 compared with \$6.65 last week and \$6.52 a year ago. The year's high was \$7.31 on February 20.
