NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—If you don't think mom is the boss in this country right now, just wait a while. She could be—if American women get richer and more influential.

Dr. George P. Murdock of Yale University told the National Academy of Sciences that, if this happened, we would get a matriarchal system like the family system the Troquois Indians once had.

Wealth would be mostly all in the women's hands. Young couples would prefer to live with the bride's mother. Who your mother was, and what women you were related to, would be the pay off in kinship.

Dr. Murdock was telling how people can be compared with atoms, male and female atoms.

There are just so many different ways that atoms can combine to form social molecules, he said.
