

Birds Studied In Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Mammal-colored mourning doves will be studied in the forest and fields of southeastern Florida by a team of biologists from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

Game departments of five South-eastern states are trapping the birds, dyeing and banding them, and releasing them. It's part of a study of their migratory habits.

Florida started the idea last year when its game department dyed scores of doves. The experiment yielded no much information about the birds' flight patterns that four other states are joining in the project this year. The dyeing does the birds to harm and has no effect on their breeding or feeding habits.

Building Boom In Singapore

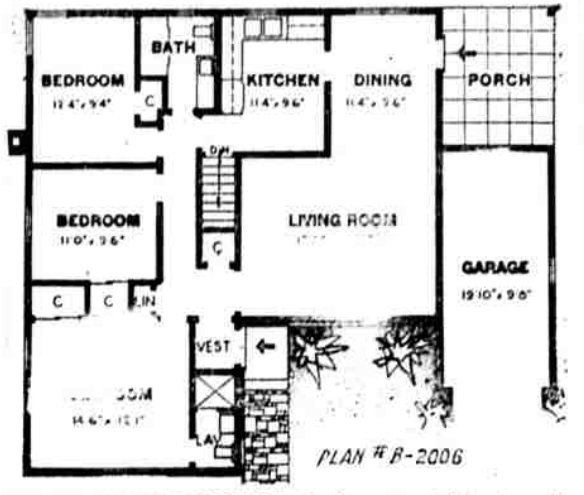
