Sea Disaster Survivors Tell of Rescue, Heroism

PORT ANGELES, W.—The master of the freighter George Walton gave the order to abandon his flaming ship, then—in the tradition of the sea—remained aboard until the last crewman was over the side.

Twelve survivors of the ship explosion and fire some 300 miles off the Washington coast Tuesday reached port here early today. They told of the bravery of the captain and crew when the freighter seemed doomed and of anxious hours in bobbing lifeboats awaiting rescue.

One man was killed aboard the ship. Five others are missing and presumed drowned. The dead man was identified today as Gus M. Larsen, second assistant engineer, from Portland.

Eighteen others who survived the disaster including the master, Capt. Alfred Bentzen, Seattle, were due here later today aboard a coast guard cutter and a Japanese freighter.

GREEK SHIP
The first survivors were brought here by the Greek freighter Katharine which bucked towering North Pacific seas to rescue them hours after responding to the distress call.

Two of the men—Chief Mate Carl A. Green, Portland, and First Asst. Eng. Ortho C. Anderson, Chinook, Wash.—were taken off the ship in stretchers and immediately flown to Seattle. Green suffered first, second and third degree burns on the arms and legs; Anderson a possible fractured leg.

Others appeared to have come through the ordeal in good condition and some were ready to go back to sea.

First Mate Harold Davis, Milwaukie, Ore., apparently one of the last to leave the ship himself, said Capt. Bentzen was the last man off. Davis said he looked back as his lifeboat pulled away from the Walton and saw Bentzen and two other men still on the stern. The Japanese freighter Kenkon Maru later rescued Bentzen and eight others in a lifeboat.

BRavery
Davis said Green was burned trying to rescue Larsen, "as brave a thing as I ever saw." Davis of Green and Anderson. "Two guys that tough just can't die. They lay all the time in my lifeboat. There wasn't a thing we could do

for them. We walked all over them trying to keep afloat. They should have drowned. The boat was full of water. We were having all the time but they never said a word."

Davis said one man—he never learned his name—was lost trying to board his lifeboat.

"He just didn't seem to have the strength to hang onto the ship's ladder. I told him to stay still and hang on, but he kept coming down. I tried to bring the lifeboat alongside but he couldn't make it. We threw him a line, but he didn't have the strength somehow to cinch it around him. He went under."

Davis praised the seamanship of the skipper of the Katherine.

"He made one pass at us and it was the right one," he said. "When he made his run I cut our sea anchor. Then we had to depend on our oars. We were too tired to pull them. If he'd missed it could have been all over."

ODDITY
"In case you're superstitious," he added, "we tried to leave

the ship with 13 men in the lifeboat. Well we got away with just 12. Funny, you know, the man we lost, just the day before for no reason at all, he took out his sea-

man's papers, tore them up and threw them away.

"Those papers are pretty important to any seaman. Can't think why he did it—unless he knew, maybe."

Hotel Sugar Poison Probed

DES MOINES, I.—A waiter, jailed for refusing to name the persons he was quoted as claiming gave him poisonous powder to mix in the sugar supply at the big Des Moines hotel where he works, was released on bond yesterday.

The waiter, Lewis Fulton, 40, posted \$500 bond after Dist. Judge J. K. Morrow declared him a material witness and directed him to appear at a December 15 hearing.

JAILED
Fulton, who had returned to his job at the picketed hotel last week, was ordered jailed by Judge Morrow Wednesday because he refused to answer questions which the judge said were important for safeguarding of the public health and welfare. The waiter said he feared reprisals if he told his story under oath.

Joseph E. Whalen, manager of Hotel Savary, said Fulton voluntarily delivered five envelopes of the powder to him last Saturday. Herring turned over two envelopes of the powder to J. Earle Galloway, Drake university pharmacy professor, for a chemical analysis. Galloway called the powder "an agent of destruction" and said that three-fourths of a grain of it had been known to kill a child in an hour and two grains to kill an adult.

He said that each of the two envelopes contained about 2200 grains of the white crystal powder.

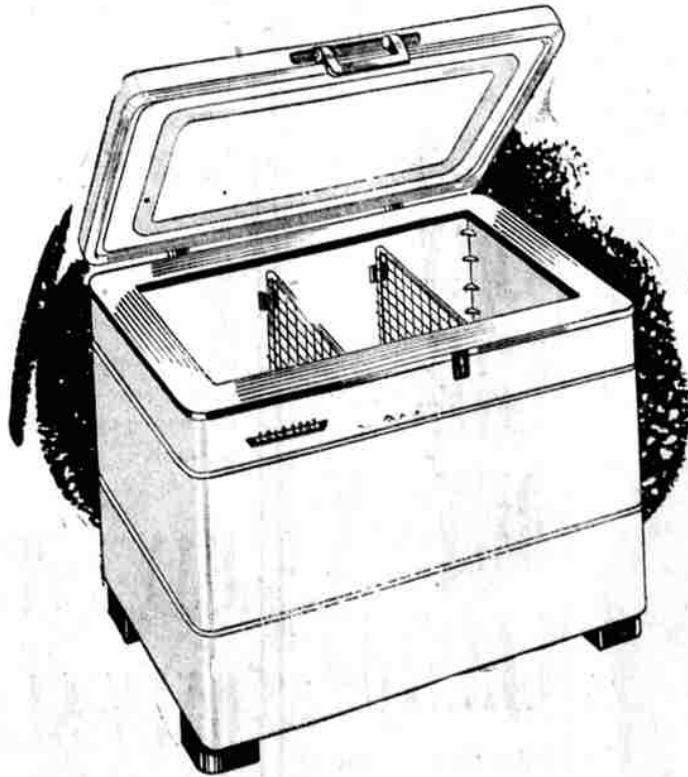

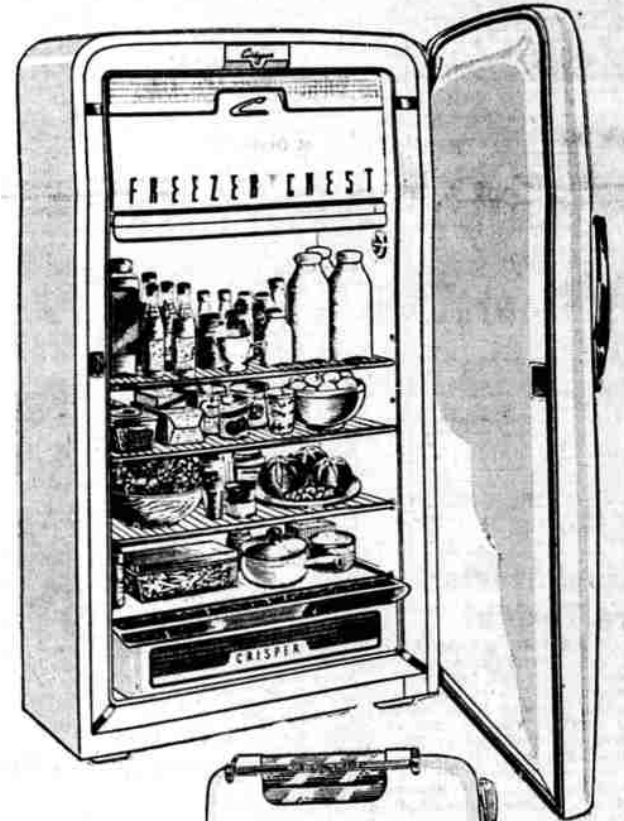

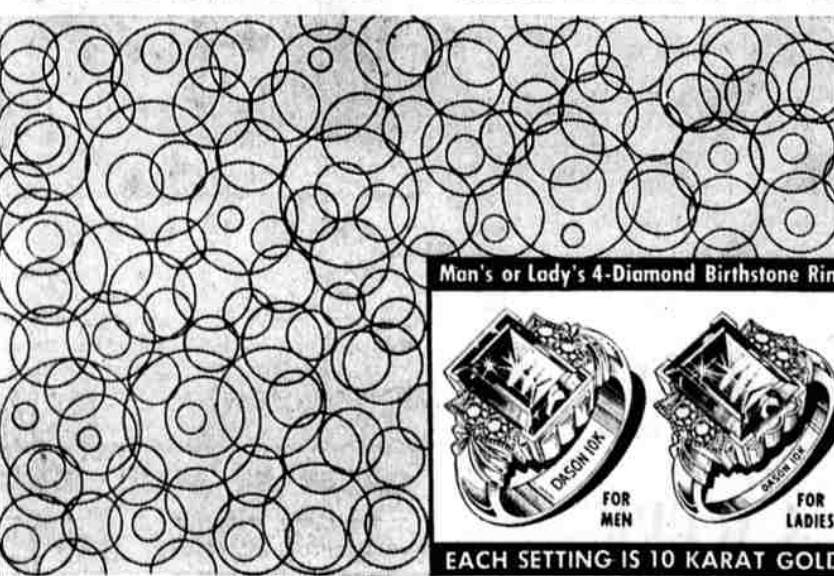
