Tragedy and hard luck hit Chiloquin full force last week. Funeral services were held in Klamath Falls last Sunday for young Herbert Lowry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Lowry. The sixth grade boy died in Portland a few days earlier as a result of his third serious attack of rheumatic fever which began two years ago. He had been making satisfactory recovery until just shortly before his passing. His older sister, Wanda, came down from Corvallis to be with the family for a few days before returning to her job there. Robert also has two younger sisters.

Most unexpected tragedy was the death of Chas. B. Knight of the Agency Lakeside district. His death on Sunday left two survivors, his wife Peritha, a son Chas. Jr. of the navy, and three daughters, Thelma, Berna, and Judith.

He was rushed to Klamath Falls and some 18 stitches had to be taken. While he was waiting in the emergency ward for treatment, Mr. and Mrs. Knight and Abraham Hair were being treated for lacerations received in the accident which later claimed Knight's life.

Thursday evening at the Wolf ranch on Sprague River Andrew J. Flury, Ted Mark, and Albert Summers were playing cards in a 14 hole high. Flury was on top when he lost his balance, fell backward on a bale which caught him under the knees and catapulted him off the stack. The others assisted him to the house but on Saturday afternoon he was taken by ambulance to Klamath Falls where X-rays revealed a fractured vertebrae. Late this week doctors will be made up as to whether he must be placed in a spinal cast or not.

Five miles south of Fort Rock, a land clearing project is being conducted on government land by the bureau of land management, Mr. Estes of California contracted the work. Charles Wolfe is foreman.
