Negro Death
Probe Slated
EUSTIS, Fla., (AP)—Sheriff Willis V. McCall's shooting of two Negro prisoners who had been reprimanded from death sentences by the U. S. supreme court definitely will be placed before the grand jury, says State Atty. J. W. Hunter.
Although the grand jury is due to meet today, Hunter said Sunday he will ask that the shooting investigation be postponed a week. Sheriff McCall was absolved of blame for the death of one of the prisoners, Samuel Shepherd by a coroner's jury Saturday night.
Samuel Shepherd came to his death by gunshot wounds at the shooting of Willis V. McCall. The said shooting was justifiable by reason that McCall was acting in line of duty and in defense of his own life.
Walter Lee Irvin, Negro prisoner who was wounded but survived last Tuesday night's shooting, testified at the inquest from his hospital bed.
CHARGE
He told the same story he had to newsmen and Gov. Fuller Warren's special investigator, J. J. Elliott, two days earlier.
Irvin testified that McCall claimed to have a faulty tire, ordered Shepherd and him to get out of the car and shot them without provocation. The Negro said Deputy Yates also shot him.
McCall and the deputy both denied Yates shot Irvin.
The sheriff testified Shepherd "hit me with my flashlight and said 'get his gun.' He sort of knocked me down to my right knee and against the car. They were all over me. They got my shirt and my hair but they didn't get my gun. I got it and started using it. I emptied it."
Investigator Elliott testified that powder burns on the sleeve of Sheriff McCall's coat indicated he had his arm doubled up. "You can see how close the man who fired came to shooting his elbow off, which shows there was some kind of a struggle," Elliott said.
Irvin's attorneys, Alex Akerman and Thurgood Marshall, telegraphed Gov. Warren Sunday night, criticizing him for not removing McCall at least temporarily.
Gov. Warren, who personally conferred with Sheriff McCall last Thursday night, has declined comment on the case.
At the time of the shooting Irvin and Shepherd were being taken from the state prison at Ralston to Tavares for a hearing in their retrial on charges of raping a white Lake county farm wife in 1949.
They had been convicted and sentenced to electrocution, but the U.S. supreme court reversed the conviction and ordered a new trial.

By Students
KYOTO, Japan, (AP)—Leftist students heckled Emperor Hirohito today when the monarch arrived at Kyoto university, but he was not molested. Police rushed to the scene and kept back the students with clubs.
The emperor, considered divine in Japan before the Allied occupation, was ushered into a building by the university president.
It was the first reported instance of a demonstration against the emperor.
