TULELAKE—Mr. and Mrs. Charles Card, long time residents of the Klamath basin and actively associated with the restaurant business since 1918 today announced the sale of the Yukon tavern.

The new owners, John Stoltz, Merrill and Alturas and W. O. Klinger, Merrill, will take over the business November 21. Both have been in the tavern business for several years.

Stoltz, currently operating a business in Alturas, owned Al's Place in Merrill, Klinger operated in Klamath Falls for a time and now runs the Idle Hour in Merrill. Mr. and Mrs. Card are retiring from active business for reasons of health. They had operated the Yukon since 1947.

John Edwards Enders, died Klamath Falls businessman, on November 5 at Seattle, and funeral services were conducted last Wednesday at Ashland.

He and his wife, Hortense, had lived in the valley city several years. Enders at one time operated a grocery store on Main street here.

Survivors include the widow; a daughter, Mrs. Shirley Willie, Olympia, Wash.; a sister, Mrs. Maude Pringle, and a brother Henry Enders.

Short Title For Soldier

DENVER (AP)—A 25-year-old Denver corporal today laid claim to the title of the shortest man in the U.S. army.

He is Amos A. Barcelona, stationed at the Rocky Mountain arsenal on the outskirts of the city.

Cpl. Barcelona is only four feet, 11 inches tall, an inch less than the minimum requirement for the army.

"I guess I talked my way in," he told a reporter. "I tried to enlist back in 1944 when I was 18 but they wouldn't have me because I was too short," he said.

The next year he went back to the enlistment station wearing a lot of hair piled up on his head. He measured out at four feet, 11½ inches and somehow persuaded the examining doctor to split the dif-

ference by calling it five feet. Cpl. Barcelona served in Japan for a year and has been stationed at the arsenal for almost five. He's married. His wife? She's four feet, seven.
