

Malin's Title Try Fizzles

Pirates' Hite Runs 100 Yards

A sharp Malin passing attack that moved the Mustangs down the muddy Medford high school field 33 yards in nine plays backfired for one brief second Saturday night to give the Phoenix Pirates a 6-0 victory over the Klamath county champions.

Big Max Hite intercepted a pass thrown by Malin's Gene Evans on his goal line and streaked 100 yards down the sidelines to give the Jackson county champions the Dist. 5 title and a quarterfinal berth in the state finals against Maupin, the Dist. 6 champion.

The Phoenix score came in the second quarter to crack open the Mustangs' lead.

THREATEN

The Mustangs threatened once before the Pirate score and roared back in the third quarter to the shadow of the Phoenix goal—but both times lost their punch in the clutch.

The Medford field was muddy from an all-day rain—and both teams had trouble keeping their offensive drives in high gear.

Phoenix was sparked by Nolan Day, an elusive scabbard, and Harold Covey, pile-driving fullback.

NOWHERE

The first quarter was spent with both teams going nowhere in particular and kicking out of danger.

Malin got a break early in the second quarter when Ronald Bean got off a bad kick that went out of bounds on the 34. Line plays failed and Evans rifled to Andy Travis on the 13. Rod Ottomann went to the 12, then a penalty set Malin back to the 17. But Bob Stevenson's end-around play that worked twice for the distance against Henley failed, as did two passes and another running play and Phoenix took over on the 22.

Covey whirled 31 yards on the first play to Malin's 47. But the Phoenix attack bogged down there and a pass by Hite was intercepted by Ottomann on the 20. The Mustang fullback roared back to the 31.

START MARCH

That's where Malin started its drive that ended with Hite's pass interception and field-long run that gave the Pirates the Dist. 5-B title.

After Evans made three on a running play, the Malin halfback found Rick and Travis on passes. Stevenson on two more as the Mustangs clicked off four first downs in a row and found themselves on the Pirate 27.

Evans circled end to the 20, passed to Travis to the 18, then Ottomann wound up and hit Stevenson with a pass on the 10. Evans squirmed to the six-yard line and Malin had four downs and just six yards to cover for a touchdown.

FROM NOWHERE

But Hite came in fast from nowhere to grab Evans' next pass smack dab on the goal line. A couple of key blocks and the big 185-pound end was on his way straight down the sidelines.

Malin cooked up another determined march early in the third quarter that was labeled touchdown.

Ottomann and Arby Paris sparked the march that started from Malin's nine-yard stripe and ended with a fumble by Ottomann—on the Phoenix 13 fourteen plays later.

Stanford Gets By Trojans

SAN FRANCISCO, (P)—Stanford's Indians were peering into the Rose Bowl today after writing the most spectacular chapter in all the football history of the university.

The 27-20 come-from-behind victory over the favored Southern California Trojans last week exceeded in thrills the 20-20 tie with California way back in 1924. Both feasts were accomplished in the last five minutes of play but in the latest eye-popper they parlayed their efforts into a win, rather than a deadlock.

While unbeaten Stanford was hurdling its greatest obstacle of the season, its boyish coach, Chuck Taylor, was tightening a claim to Coach of the Year honors, no less. The 31-year old rookie mentor so far has done everything asked. In his first year as headman, he and his team have won eight games in a row.

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Bolt Cops N-S Open

PINEHURST, N. C., (P)—Tommy Bolt, the Texan who plays golf out of Durham, N. C., has "created some thunder," as Cary Middlecott put it, and finally crashed into the big winner's circle of professional golf.

The 33-year-old Bolt, in his sixth year as a professional, has a \$1500 check in his pocket today after coming in with a three-under par 69 to win the \$7500 North and South Open by three strokes yesterday.

Bolt's 283 on rounds of 71-72-71-69 was five under par for 72 holes around the 7007-yard No. 2 course of the Pinehurst country club.

Tommy, who's been on the tour for nearly a decade, has won two titles, has threatened before, but something always happened somewhere along the line to keep him from winning a big one. He tied for fourth in the Miami, Fla., Open last fall and a week after that was last in the Savannah, Ga., Open. That was as close as he got to the important money. Known for his occasional club-breaking tendencies in former years, he was in control of himself and his game at all times.

John Barnum, the giant Grand Rapids pro who holds the Michigan Open title, was as much a surprise as Bolt, in charging up to take second place, and \$1000 with his 71-73-72-70 for 286. Barnum had to shoot a 75 Tuesday to qualify for the tournament as his record wasn't gaudy enough to earn him an invitation.

Aragon Gets Title Shot

LOS ANGELES, (P)—Art Aragon, who is a prizefighter and not to be confused with a thousand dance halls of the same name, gets the big chance of his career Wednesday night.

Aragon climbs into the ring at the Olympic auditorium to face the unfriendly countenance and bristling fists of the lightweight champion of the world, Jimmy Carter of New York.

Aragon felt those fists just last August.

True, Aragon left the ring that night acclaimed as the winner of a non-title bout. But the decision was a split affair.

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Bend In, Vale Cinches Last Berth in Playoff

The state high school play-offs begin next week end. Most of the games will be played Friday, although some of the dates haven't been set.

Bend will meet Grant at Portland. Astoria will play host to Hillsboro. Grants Pass will be at Marshfield, and Roosevelt of Portland at Milton-Freewater. Toledo goes to Portland to play Columbia Prep. Canby will be at North Marion and Coquille at Eugene to meet University High of that city. Prineville will play at Vale.

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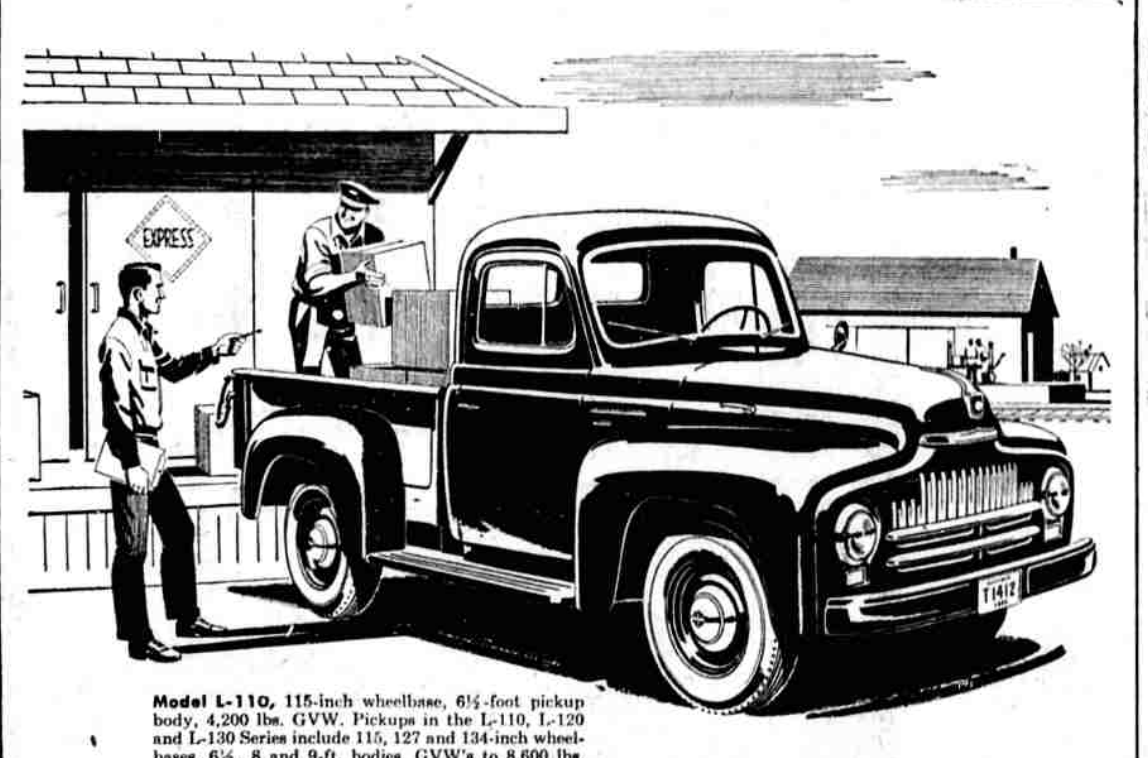
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
