### Taft to Shun Ballot Fight in Pennsylvania

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Supporters indicated today Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) will keep clear of an impending fight for control of Pennsylvania's 70-vote delegation to next year's GOP presidential nominating convention.

Although Taft's backers believe he can gain some support among these delegates his bid for top spot on the ticket, they said that unless plans are changed his name will not be entered in the state's April 22 presidential primary.

Sen. Duff (R-PA) served notice yesterday that there is going to be plenty of action in Pennsylvania at the proper time in behalf of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. He wouldn't say, however, whether the general's name will go in the primary, where it could be entered without any action on the part of the candidate.

CANDIDATE? Duff has been proclaiming that Eisenhower is a Republican and will be available for that party's nomination. However, Sen. Edward Martin (R-PA) told reporters at a Harrisburg meeting also attended by Duff he doubts that Eisenhower will run.

"I don't think he will want to give up his job in Europe," Martin said.

This apparently represents the viewpoint of a faction headed by G. Mason Owlett, Republican national committeeman, and may also be the view of Gov. John S. Fine.

Fine was elected with Duff's help in a battle with the long-dominant state organization headed by former U.S. Sen. Joseph R. Grundy.

HOLLYWOOD, (AP)—What's going to happen to Thomas Kavanaugh? Actress Jane Russell brought him to the United States with her from London, then left the 15-month-old boy with her mother in New York while she came on home.

Yesterday Miss Russell disclosed that her mother, Mrs. Geraldine Jacoby Russell, had arrived here with the youngster.

But she still did not know what she is going to do about Tommy. It will be a couple of months, she said, before a decision is made.

Miss Russell went to Europe to find a baby to adopt. Immigration restrictions, she learned, might make adoption difficult. So instead of adopting a baby, she yielded to the plea of Mrs. Florrie Kavanaugh to take Tommy to America for a "visit" and give him a new life.

Miss Russell said she has received 500 letters from persons who want to adopt the child.

Douglas S. Steinberg, director of public relations, made that prediction Monday to delegates to the niques and the expanded tree-farm program are responsible for the association's convention.

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### Far West Has Highest Wages

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The average pay scale in the Far West is the highest in the nation.

Commerce department economists believe that accounts for most of the population influx on the West coast in recent years.

In a new publication on regional trends in the U.S. economy, the commerce department undertakes to explain why people move.

"The most common reason for migration is to take a job or look for work away from home," the report states.

**INCREASE** During the 20 years between 1929 and 1949, population in the four-state far Western region—Washington, Oregon, California and Nevada—increased 74 percent.

Virtually all the population growth was attributed to net migration, since the rate of natural increase was only slightly above the national average.

The Far West rose to the top in per capita income in 1941. Aggregate income payments in the region more than tripled in the past 20 years.

This resulted from larger-than-average pay increases in most lines of industry, particularly manufacturing, trade and service industries.

In a majority of major industries, like retail trade, services, the finance, insurance and real estate group, public utilities construction and manufacturing, the average salary-wage in the Far West is above those in all other regions.

**SHIFT SHARE** This appears to account for the westward movement of about one-fourth of the total migration within the United States.

Studies of postwar civilian population movements by the census bureau show that persons who migrate average somewhat younger than those who stay at home. The more education a person has, the more likely he is to move.

### Princess, Pal Visit Orson

LONDON, (AP)—Princess Margaret and her American pal, Sharran Douglas, daughter of former Ambassador to Britain Lewis Douglas, chatted backstage Monday night with actor Orson Welles after his performance of Shakespeare's "Othello."

The princess congratulated Welles on his portrayal of the tragic Moor.

Welles, who plays the part in built-up heels and padded shoulders to give his already sizeable figure added bulk, has been splitting Britain's critical ranks wide open over his handling of the role.

The purists protest that he trimmed and rearranged the lord's lines. His supporters praise the way he rolls out the Shakespearean phrases in his deep bass voice.

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### First Nominee For President

SEATTLE, (AP)—A Seattle neighborhood grocer is the nation's first nominee for the 1952 presidential race.

But, he says modestly from behind his campaign counter, he doesn't really expect to win.

The Greenback party announced in Indianapolis yesterday the nomination of Fred C. Proehl of Seattle for the White House.

"Let's have more of the green stuff,"
