Russian Sub Force Large?

LONDON, (AP)—Brassey's Annual, an unofficial British review of the world's armed forces, says Russia has a formidable submarine force which is causing apprehension among other naval powers.

The review—generally considered to receive its information from authoritative sources—said Russia is believed to have 280 submarines in service and 120 more under construction.

It said the Soviet Union now has some 2,800,000 men under arms and could mobilize 300 divisions—half of Russia's world war two peak—within two months of an outbreak of war.

Soviet military organizations, the review continued, are ruled by "an iron discipline enforced by Stalin himself." The army has been completely reorganized under chiefs of proven ability, it added, but the officer corps is weak in its reluctance to accept responsibility.

The Russian air force has "very large numbers" of high quality jet fighters, notably the MIG-15 seen in Korea, the review said, but a copy of the U. S. B-29 superfortress is still its only heavy bomber in service.

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
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23 Years Ago
