

# CAVEMEN END HIGH Spartans Top Poll

## Stanford Jumps To 4th Spot

NEW YORK. (AP)—Michigan State, back on top in the Associated Press football poll, may be hard to dislodge from its position as the No. 1 team in the nation.

The spectacular Spartans take on Indiana Saturday and close out their season the following week against Colorado. Both games should prove easy for the infant members of the Big Ten.

Tennessee, which dropped to second after a three-week reign at the top, has three toughies barring its way to a perfect season. The Vols take on Mississippi, Kentucky and Vanderbilt.

Illinois has two tough contenders games remaining against Ohio State and Northwestern.

Three other unbeaten and untied teams followed the top three. Stanford, with eight victories, came in fourth with 951 points. Maryland, boasting seven victories, placed with 927 points and Princeton, also unbeaten in seven outings, was sixth with 793 points. Rounding out the top ten are Georgia Tech, Wisconsin, Kentucky and Baylor in that order.

**BEAT TROJANS**  
Stanford gained fourth on the strength of its 27-20 victory over Southern California. Maryland breezed to a 40-21 win over Navy and Princeton staggered Harvard, 24-13.

Georgia Tech's unbeaten but ending Engineers moved up to seventh after trouncing VMI, 34-7. Wisconsin edged into eighth place despite a tough 16-7 decision over Pennsylvania. Kentucky smacked Tulane, 37-0. Baylor moved back into the tenth slot by trimming Texas, 18-6.

Both Southern Cal and Texas dropped out of the top ten. The Trojans fell from sixth to 11th and Texas dropped from ninth to 15th.

"A person does not send his son or daughter to school to have him become a chattel over television or radio," Crowley added.

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## Pirates Fall From Top Ten

GRANTS Pass made it eight straight this week and again was named the No. 1 team in the final Associated Press high school football poll of the season. Every sportswriter and sportswriter participating gave Grants a first-place vote.

Roosevelt of Portland held to its No. 2 spot in the final poll, receiving all the votes for second place.

**CHANGES**

There were some changes in the rest of the top ten. Astoria moved up from No. 4 to No. 3 after winning its ninth straight game last weekend, 29-0 over Salem. Grant of Portland also moved up one place to fourth position.

Hillsboro, No. 3 last week, skidded to No. 5, only a few points ahead of Milton-Freewater in No. 6. Gresham held Hillsboro to a 12-12 tie last weekend while Milton-Freewater was downing Pendleton, 33-7.

Prineville moved up to No. 7 after rolling over Redmond, 26-0. University High of Eugene advanced to eighth place after holding Eugene high to a scoreless tie.

**MOVE UP**

Coquille moved up from the also-rans to the No. 9 position, just one point ahead of Eugene in No. 10.

Although winning a playoff spot by downing North Bend, 13-0, the Marshfield Pirates fell from the top ten. Marshfield wound up a few points behind Eugene and topped the also-rans.

Prineville, University High and Coquille are the only class A-2 schools in the first ten. The others are from Class A-1, the state's largest schools.

Eugene is the only team in the top ten that won't go into the state playoffs this weekend. Eugene was ineligible because it did not schedule enough district opponents.

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## Bend Tips Pelicans In Snow

BEND (Special)—The Bend Lava Bears, Dist. 8 A-1 representatives in the state playoffs, notched their first victory over Klamath Falls since 1946 yesterday with a 26-12 win over the Pelicans second period.

The Armistice Day classic between the rival schools was highlighted by a swirling snowstorm which fell throughout the second half.

The Bruins, playing their best game of the season, took command early in the contest by taking the opening kickoff and marching 70 yards for the first tally.

**RECOVER FUMBLE**

After two unsuccessful goalward marches of their own late in the first and early in the second periods, the Pelicans capitalized on a recovered fumble deep in Bend territory and hung up their first score on a 31-yard aerial from Ken Young to Jack Horton.

Failure to convert, however, gave Bend a 7-6 edge, which the Bears extended to 13-6 by halftime.

Neither team could score in the third frame as snow kept both the Pelis and Bears from shifting into high gear.

**SOLVE SNOW**

Midway in the final quarter Bend solved the weather problem with a one-yard line punch by Frank Ellis for the Bruins' third score.

Bend added its last touchdown late in the game with another one-yard plunge, this time by Dick Laursen.

With 40 seconds remaining, the Pelis snapped to life and Horton grabbed another touchdown pass, this time a 24-yard pitch from Bill Pickett.

**PASSES**

Bend's first-half scores were negotiated on short passes to end Dean Benson.

The winner lead in first downs, 11-10.

The game closed the season for the Pelis, finishing with a 2-5-1 record.

Bend, meantime, swings into drills for the state quarterfinal opener with Grant of Portland. Bend was voted in Saturday, ending tied with Salem for the Big Six title.

## TURNER STOPS DOCUSEN WITH HAIL OF LEATHER

PHILADELPHIA. (AP)—Gil Turner feels he has passed all the tests necessary for a fight with welterweight champion Kid Gavilan.

The 21-year-old Philadelphia won his 25th and most convincing triumph of an unbeaten career last night when he threw so many punches at Bernie (Big Duke) Docusen, the clever little Filipino decided discretion was the better part of valor and quit in his corner.

Docusen refused to come out for the seventh round. He told ringside physician Dr. W. G. Terry he had had enough. And in his convention hall dressing room, the New Orleans veteran said Turner was just too good for him.

**"NOTHING LEFT"**

"I had nothing left. Turner is everything they said he was. I wouldn't have believed one man could throw so many punches if I hadn't felt them."

Dr. Terry who examined Docusen's cuts, bleeding and closed left eye said he believed one man could throw so many punches if I hadn't felt them.

Turner weighed 146½ in stopping his 22nd opponent.

The crowd of 6035 who paid \$36.905 to see the scheduled 10 round contest were in agreement almost to a man with Docusen that the little 145½ pound Filipino had enough at the end of the sixth.

At the opening bell, Turner charged from his corner and started flailing rights and lefts that certainly landed on all legal portions of Docusen's anatomy. Tossing punches in windmill style, Gil never let up his pace.
