

Owls Need Win Over EOCE To Cinch OCC Second Spot

Friday Homecoming Game Closes Season

Highlight of Oregon Tech's Homecoming Day Friday is the serious business of beating Eastern Oregon College of Education's football team on Modoc Field. Kickoff time is 8 o'clock.

It's more than just the season-closer for the Owls, putting the lid on its most successful season in four campaigns in the football wars. It's an Oregon Collegiate conference game. The Owls, to finish second in the young four-team circuit, must beat the Mountaineers. A win for EOCE—unlikely on the records but possible if the Owls suffer a letdown after their sparkling 4-1-1 win over Weber College last Friday—would throw the OCC loop into a three-way tie between the Owls, Mountaineers and the Vaport Vikings.

TOP TEN

An overwhelming win over Eastern Oregon could put the Owls in the top ten.

Scoring threat for Eastern Oregon is halfback Jim McAllister, a breakaway back who is main ground-gainer and leading scorer on the squad.

The team may miss the services of fullback Jim Courtney, injured in EOCE's 46-13 loss to College of Idaho last week. Courtney holds a 44.6 punt average this season and his booting chores would be handled by end Jim Mallon, place-kicking specialist.

The Owls came out of the rugged Weber game injury-free and should be in shape to hand the fans a hepped-up closing gridiron show.

Against common league opponents, OTI boasts a distinct edge. Eastern Oregon lost to OCC (14-47) and Vaport (21-25). The Owls dropped a 6-19 decision to Oregon College but waxed Vaport by a 27-7 count.

The Owls currently rate Number 11 among the nation's junior colleges on the Williamson rating.

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Six State Finalists Hold Perfect Records

Six unbeaten and untied teams will be in the fight for the state championship when high school football teams open their annual state playoffs next weekend.

Foremost is Grants Pass, winner of eight straight games and No. 1 in every Associated Press poll since the start of the season. Grants Pass, undefeated last year too, now has 19 straight victories. The Cavemen will meet Marshfield, which has a record of seven wins and two losses, in the first round.

NINE STRAIGHT

Two teams will go into the playoffs with a record of nine straight victories this season. One of them is Astoria, the No. 3 team in the final AP poll of the season. Astoria will play Hillsboro in the first round. Hillsboro also is unbeaten, but has one tie in nine games.

The other with nine consecutive wins is Prineville, which also must tackle an undefeated foe in the first round. Prineville will meet Vale, which has eight consecutive victories.

23 IN ROW

The other two undefeated and untied teams are Milton-Freewater and Toledo. Milton-Freewater, winner of eight straight, will play Roosevelt of Portland. Toledo, victor in six straight, will meet Columbia Prep of Portland. Toledo's

string, running back to previous years, has not been defeated in 23 consecutive games.

Among the unbeaten but tied teams are the previously mentioned Hillsboro, University High of Eugene, and North Marion University with seven wins and one tie will play Coquille (6-1) next weekend. North Marion with seven wins and two ties will meet Canby (7-1).

In addition there is Roosevelt of Portland, the state's No. 2 team. Roosevelt has not been defeated on the gridiron, but was forced to give up one victory upon discovery that a little-used reserve was ineligible. Roosevelt has 7 wins and one loss, a mark equaled by Grant of Portland and Canby.
