Maryland Back Gets Top Vote

NEW YORK (AP)—Ed Modzelewski, Maryland fullback, is this week's Back of the Week in the Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters. Known as the "Mighty Mo," the 200-pound fullback earned the nod for his feats against Navy, Maryland gained only 133 yards by rushing and Modzelewski gained 127 of them. Two of his plunges went for touchdowns.

PECKY—Modzelewski proved so pecky in the first half that Navy pulled its secondary closer and closer to the line. This opened the way for Maryland passing that broke the game wide open for a 40-21 Maryland triumph.

The Maryland workhorse was not the only back to gain praise. Another fullback, Bob McElhenny, whose 96-yard touchdown run opened Stanford to its upset win over Southern California was high on the list. So was Dick Patten's 85-yard tally run on Michigan State's first play from scrimmage, a play that sparked MSC to a 35-0 conquest of Notre Dame.

GOODY STARS—Jerry Goody, Baylor halfback, ran back a punt to set up the tying touchdown against Texas, then later scored the winning touchdown himself as Baylor beat Texas for the first time in 12 years.

Others praised included: Bill Burkhalter, Rice; Tony Scardino, Missouri; and Hugh McElhenny, Washington, who scored three touchdowns against California and converted four extra points last week.

INDIANAPOLIS—Alex Delvecchio of the Indianapolis Capitals in the American Hockey League had an auspicious introduction to professional hockey. He scored the winning goal in overtime in his first game in the pro ranks.

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Williams, Aragon In Title Scuffle Tonight

LOS ANGELES (AP)—That hardy, muscle-throated specimen of sports, the fight fan, moved closer to the usual bedlam today as champion Jimmy Carter of New York and challenger Art Aragon of Los Angeles prepared to enter the ring at the Olympic Auditorium tonight to battle for the world lightweight title.

Cal Eaton, promoter of the 15-round attraction, remained confident that all or most of the arena's 10,000 seats would be sold, with the patrons digging deep for seats ranging in price from \$20 to \$45.

NO PROBLEM—The nation's television fans, excluding the Southern California blackout area, have no problem. They'll see it for free over the CBS network, starting at 10 p.m. Eastern Standard Time.

Carter, the 27-year-old Negro who blasted like Williams out of the title by a 14-round knockout in New York last May 23, is a slight betting favorite in this, his first defense of the crown.

Aragon, 24-year-old Mexican who revels in the nickname of "Golden Boy," may be quoted as an even wager or possibly a slim favorite, by fight time.

SPLIT NOD—Aragon was given a split decision over Carter in a 10-round non-title match here last Aug. 26.

Aragon weighed in at 137½, for this bout and the thought still prevails that he might be hampered by making the required 135.

Aragon has scored 22 knockouts in 64 matches, and like Carter, has been stopped but once, by Clyde Chis in 1948.

The first Carter-Aragon fight was intense, a little dull in the middle rounds, and dramatic at the finish. Certainly the fight and the decision, engendered a bitter feeling between the rival camps.
