Lunch Program Important Part of Modern Schools

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles on educational facilities in the Klamath area commemorating American Education Week, November 11-17.)

A good lunch is essential to students in grade schools and high school. Supplying at least one third of the child's food needs, lunch gives the student needed energy to complete the school day.

Serving approximately 25,300 lunches a month, the school cafeterias, under the direction of Mrs. C. H. Barstabile, prepare nourishing and pleasant meals for the reasonable price of 20 cents for the first two grades, 25 cents for all the other grades and 30 cents for adults.

The seven-grade-school cafeterias are governed by the state school lunch program which is directed by Mrs. Laura P. Wells, Salem.

The high school is independent from the lunch program, which pays four cents per child's lunch prepared in the grade schools.

PURPOSE
The aims of this program are to serve type A meals at a low price. The state program requires the

lunches while the high school has both the plate lunch and the a la carte service. This service includes such items as sandwiches, soup, hot dogs, ice-cream bars and the dessert.

The cooks serve attractive, tasty and varied meals that will encourage the child to eat and enjoy them. Children who are unable to afford the price can work in the kitchen doing odd jobs or as cashiers. This way everyone benefits from the food and eats a good lunch.

the cafeterias: Meat loaf, potatoes, gravy, cole slaw, radishes, melon, milk; and Hungarian goulash, green beans, celery sticks, peanut butter sandwich, chocolate pudding with 10 percent milk and milk.

As many fresh fruits and vegetables as possible are served when in season.

During National Education Week, the school cafeterias deserve commendation for their outstanding work in preparing nourishing lunches at small cost to the pupil.

OREGON CITY, Ore.—A log scaler was fatally injured Wednesday when struck by a rolling log at the Clackamas Lumber Co.

Melvin R. Webb, 30, Oregon City, was dead on arrival at a hospital here after a truck driver prevented him from drowning in a millpond.

Coroner Ray Rillance said Melvin D. Lee, the truck driver, told him Webb jumped into the pond to try to avoid being hit by rolling logs released from the truck. He was struck by one of the logs in the pond.

Lee jumped in and held him above water until help came.

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Death Claims Mrs. Hessig

Mrs. Augusta May Hessig, 58, died late Tuesday in a San Jose, Calif., hospital following a year-long illness.

A native of Klamath county, Mrs. Hessig was born in Fort Klamath February 23, 1893, the daughter of a well known pioneer family.

She married John Hessig, who developed a telephone system throughout northern Klamath county and Lakeview which some 20 years ago was sold to the West Coast telephone company.

She owned property near the city fire department, as well as the Melhane building, now vacant.

Most of her life was spent in Klamath county, though in later

years she lived with her husband in Berkeley and at the Stone ranch. For the past year Mrs. Hessig had been living with a daughter, Mrs. Charlotte Hornbuckle, in San Jose.

Other survivors include a son, Richard, Klamath Falls; a daughter, Jo, San Francisco; and a sister, Mrs. Eva Soule, Klamath Falls.

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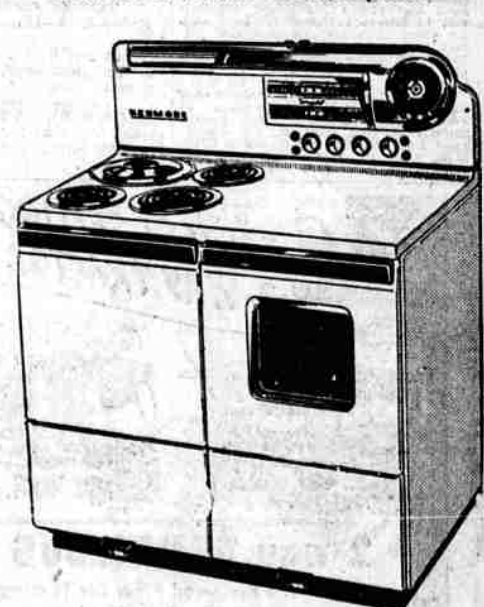


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
