RFC announced Wednesday it is offering the hotel, the Tahoe-Biltmore, for sale. The agency foreclosed in 1949 after the hotel went broke. It's been closed ever since.

Court Leaves Old Numbers, New No. 1 Equity Case Set

Klamath county's circuit court passed almost without notice something of a landmark the other day. Equity case No. 1 was filed.

Not the first equity proceeding, of course, in the 68-year history of the court, but a new No. 1.

The system of numbers for cases filed for court action had become so cumbersome—in the equity division it had reached 10,100—that the decision was made to start all over again for the sake of brevity.

The first case No. 1 was a matter brought up in the May, 1933, term of court, a lawsuit filed by E. O. Heidrich against Adam Wolf.

At that time the same numbering system was used for all types of court filings, whether law, equity or criminal. Sometime later the three were separated.

But the original string of numbers, carried over into the equity division, grew from that Heidrich vs. Wolf case until last September 27 case No. 10,100 was put on file.

It was a divorce proceeding, Joy Elaine Rechel vs. Ernest H. Rechel.

At that point County Clerk Charles DeLap decided it was time to call a halt and start over. The next equity proceeding filed, also on September 27 and also a divorce case was listed as No. 1.

The case is that of Jessie Turby Bandy vs. Earl Norman Bandy.

Practically all matters filed in the equity division are divorce or marriage annulment suits. The present system of filing law cases has reached up to No. 6431, and felony criminal proceedings have reached No. 2196.

ENJOY INEXPENSIVE PRIZE-WINNING ORANGE MARMALADE

It's Easy to Make Anytime with This Simple Recipe

6 Medium Sized Oranges (2 lbs. sliced)

6 Cups Water

1/2 Cup M.C.P. Lemon Juice (About 6 lemons)

1 Package (3 1/2-oz.) M.C.P. Jam and Jelly Pectin

2 1/2 Level Cups Sugar (Measured ready for use)

1. Cut oranges in car wheels with very sharp knife to make slices thin as possible. Discard the large flat peel ends. Sliced fruit should weigh 2 pounds.

2. Put sliced fruit in 8-quart kettle. Add the water and lemon juice.

3. Bring to a quick boil, boil gently for 1 hour (uncovered). If peel is not tender in 1 hour, boil until tender.

4. Measure the cooked material. Due to boiling, the volume will be reduced. Add water to make total peel and juice exactly 7 level cups.

5. Put back in kettle. Stir in M.C.P. Pectin, continue stirring and bring to a full boil.

6. Add sugar (previously measured). Stir gently until it has reached a full rolling boil, and BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire; skim and stir by turns for 5 minutes.

7. Pour into jars. If you use pint or quart jars, seal hot and invert jars on lids until Marmalade begins to set. Then, shake well and set jars upright. This keeps the peel evenly distributed throughout.

NOTE: This recipe works equally well with Navel Oranges or Valencia. When either variety is over-ripe and peel is soft, use 3/4 cup lemon juice instead of 1/2 cup. (Be sure to discard any seeds.) Recipe Orange Marmalade. (Cut out and keep this recipe.)

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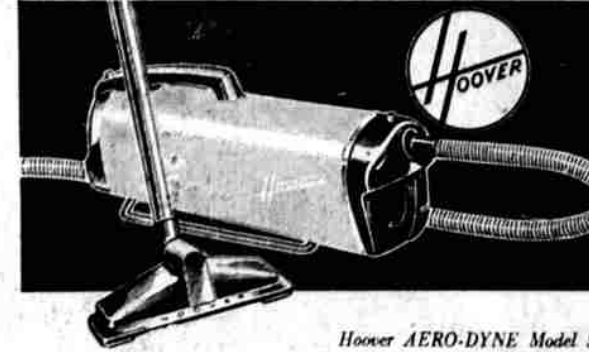

Despite a record turkey crop this year, prices of the traditional Thanksgiving feast bird will average slightly higher than last year.
Final prices for turkeys in the big buying days next week will not be set until about Monday. And spokesmen for major store chains and independents said little change was expected between now and then, so shoppers generally can expect to pay about four to five cents a pound more than a year ago.
PLENTY
A crop estimated at around 52-600,000 birds, or about one-sixth larger than last year's, will assure plenty of turkeys. The popular eight to 12 pound sizes may be in somewhat tight supply in a few scattered places, but food men agree that with a little shopping around, housewives should be able to order just about anything they needed.
The cranberry crop this year is somewhat below last year's record but still a big one—916,000 barrels. Prices are expected to stay only slightly above a year ago.
Most of the other foods of interest to holiday menu-planners are plentiful, too, and many will be featured specials in big-volume stores this weekend. They include celery, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, chestnuts and walnuts, oranges, several varieties of apples, pie crust mixes and plum pudding.
IRREGULAR
Meat prices followed an irregular trend this week. New ceiling adjustments by the office of price stabilization, effective Tuesday, resulted in some sharp increases in prices of veal, lamb and mutton, but the changes were not uniform and varied widely.
Pork prices also showed wide fluctuations in some marketing areas. Beef prices were mostly steady. Chicken was unchanged to six cents a pound higher.
On fresh produce counters, cabbage, tomatoes, brussels sprouts

and spinach all were lower, reflecting heavier supplies. Carrots and snap beans advanced.
Wholesale food prices posted the first upturn in six weeks, according to the Dun & Bradstreet food

index which advanced to \$6.67 from last week's \$6.64 (the 1951 low to date). A year ago the index was \$6.58. It represents the total wholesale cost of one pound each of 31 general use foods.
