Nobel Prize Money Eyed

BERKELEY, (AP)—Two Nobel prize winning University of California scientists have no idea how they'll spend their prize money, \$16,000 each.

"The only plan I have is not to spend it all in one place," said Dr. Edward M. McMillan.

"I haven't asked my wife yet," said Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, chemist.

Notification of the awards touched off a most unscientific celebration in the school's chemistry department yesterday. Students exploded firecrackers as they did two years ago when U.C. chemist William Glauque won his Nobel prize.

McMillan, co-discoverer with Seaborg of the atomic fuel plutonium, was joshed by fellow scientists because he had won the prize in chemistry.

Warren Heads Stock Group

C. M. (Chuck) Warren, operator of the Klamath Falls proved sire artificial breeding service, has been elected manager of the Klamath County Livestock Marketing Assoc.

Warren, who came here in 1949, will maintain his regular business as well as the manager's position with offices at his home near Hager.

The marketing association was recently organized as a membership drive, and was planned to facilitate buying, ordering and selling livestock.

Warren was selected by farm bureau members in a meeting this week.

Farm bureau members plan to make a load shipment by marketing association facilities in the near future but at the moment only part of a load is ready. Earl Kerns, Keno road, has been trying to find another farm bureau member with stock ready to ship.

A trial load was received here several weeks ago, with every major requirement requested fulfilled.

FAMED POLITICO DIES

SPOKANE, (AP)—Mrs. Teresa M. Graham of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, first woman ever to attend a major political convention as an official state delegate, died here Monday night after a long illness. She was 83. Mrs. Graham was Idaho's national Democratic committee woman for 20 years and attended six national conventions, the last in 1936. At the 1916 convention in St. Louis she was the first official woman delegate.

Prison Desire Fulfilled

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—A 62-year-old handyman, who told officers he wanted to go to prison, got his wish: a three-year sentence to the federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

Harry Hilton was sentenced Thursday by U. S. Dist. Judge Seymour H. Lyne. He had been charged with breaking mail box glasses in the post office at Cullman, Ala.

Hilton told U.S. Marshal Raymond Thomason he broke the windows because he had "no work and no place to go." He said he wanted to return to the Atlanta penitentiary because he had served a previous term there. "It's the only place where they let me work," he told the marshal.
