News Circuit Goes Modern

OKLAHOMA CITY, (AP)—The Associated Press started delivering its news report by teletypewriter circuit yesterday to call all afternoon papers in Oklahoma which are members of the organization.

At 1 p.m. 14 Oklahoma papers and another in Arkansas joined the AP's trunk teletypewriter circuit and became the westernmost point on a wire stretching over much of the East and Midwest.

All of the papers will receive five hours of trunk wire service daily, followed by nine hours of service on a state teletypewriter circuit originating in the Oklahoma City A.P. bureau.

TWO-WAY Newspapers on the teletypewriter circuit will receive the news on a special teletypewriter which prints lines in the same length and style as they appear in the paper, or on a perforated tape which can be used to set type automatically—or both.

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11 Orphans Shun Wealthy Home to Avoid Adoption

PONTIAC, Mich., (AP)—Charlie Moss, 73, and his wife, Stella, 68, shouldered the responsibility today of taking care of their 11 orphaned grandchildren.

"I am sure it will work out all right," said Mrs. Moss. "We will have plenty of help from relatives and friends."

The 11 children, sons and daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Murray Moore were orphaned when their parents were killed in an automobile crash Saturday. Four teenagers in the second car also were killed.

The elderly grandparents will close their own home in neighboring Royal Oak and move to the nine-room home in nearby Leonard that the Moores obtained just six weeks before their deaths.

ENOUGH ROOM "It was the first place we ever had that was big enough for all of us," said Gerald, 15, the oldest child.

The children were placed in care of their maternal grandparents by Probate Judge Arthur E. Moore (no relation) yesterday. He named two uncles, Richard T. Moss and Arthur Mercure, as guardians to watch after financial affairs of the orphans.

A trust fund has been started for them by neighbors and others touched by their plight. It already exceeds \$2000.

Judge Moore rejected all pleas for adoption of the children, but did not close the door on that possibility. The jurist said the children, aged from six weeks up, could visit the John Donald Babbs family in Pittsburgh as weekend guests during the next two months.

The Babbs, parents of three children, drove here in hope of adopting the whole Moore brood. They were obviously disappointed with the ruling. Babbs is a wealthy broker.

TOGETHER The children expressed a desire to remain together among their relatives and chums.

Gerald, 15, declining an invitation to visit the Babbs next weekend, told reporters:

"I'm not going now. Maybe in a few weeks I would go down, just to see them. But if they had a million dollars and everything in the world besides, I wouldn't want to be adopted. Neither would any of the other kids."

Woman Can't Sue Lodge

AKRON, O., (AP)—Can a woman sue the Elks for injuries received in a fall? Not if her husband belongs to the lodge.

That was the ruling of the ninth district court of appeals Wednesday in a case filed by Mrs. Nellie Damm of Elyria.

She asked \$15,000 for injuries allegedly suffered while attending a dinner at the Elks' Elyria lodge with her husband.

The court held that by suing the lodge, she was in effect suing her husband, which is contrary to law.

Her husband, William, had died after the action was filed.

CO-OP CONTINUES

HERMISTON, (AP)—The old Hermiston cooperative cannery and laundry has voted not to liquidate, at least not now. The cooperative, founded in the late 1920s by a Hermiston group, elected a new board of directors with Mrs. Floyd Snyder the only holdover. The board will meet December 1 to talk about what to do. When it was seen that the co-op was in a bad way financially and would have to close, a membership drive was started in the west end of the county. This apparently has forestalled liquidation.

Girls Riot At College

MONTGOMERY, Ala., (AP)—Police Lt. H. Goins said numerous women students rioted and caused considerable damage at a dormitory at the Alabama State College for Negroes Thursday.

College officials refused notice aid after first calling for officers, Goins said. No indication of what caused the disturbance was given, he added.

Detectives answering the call said broken glass was very thick on all floors of the portion of the building they entered. A night watchman fired a pistol while police were on the scene, Goins reported.

Suit Charges Nose Bopped

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—A Hollywood dentist wants \$15,000 for damage to his nose in a melee following a traffic accident in which actress Judy Garland and producer Sid Luft were involved.

Dr. Reuben Larson filed suit Wednesday against Luft. He said he was a bystander trying to help possibly injured persons, and that Luft swung on him and broke his nose.

The accident occurred September 30. Police were told Luft left Miss Garland in a nearby bar while he went on an errand, and that she appeared on the scene after hearing the crash.

OIL DEAL

ROSEBURG, (AP)—Stockholders of Oil Developers, Inc., have accepted an offer by Union Oil Co. to continue the Coles valley oil operation about 20 miles northwest of here.
