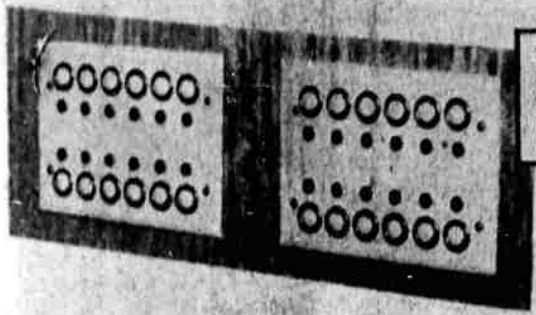




THE TOUCH PLATE panel so captivated the photographer that he took a separate picture. All the lights in the house are controlled from this panel.

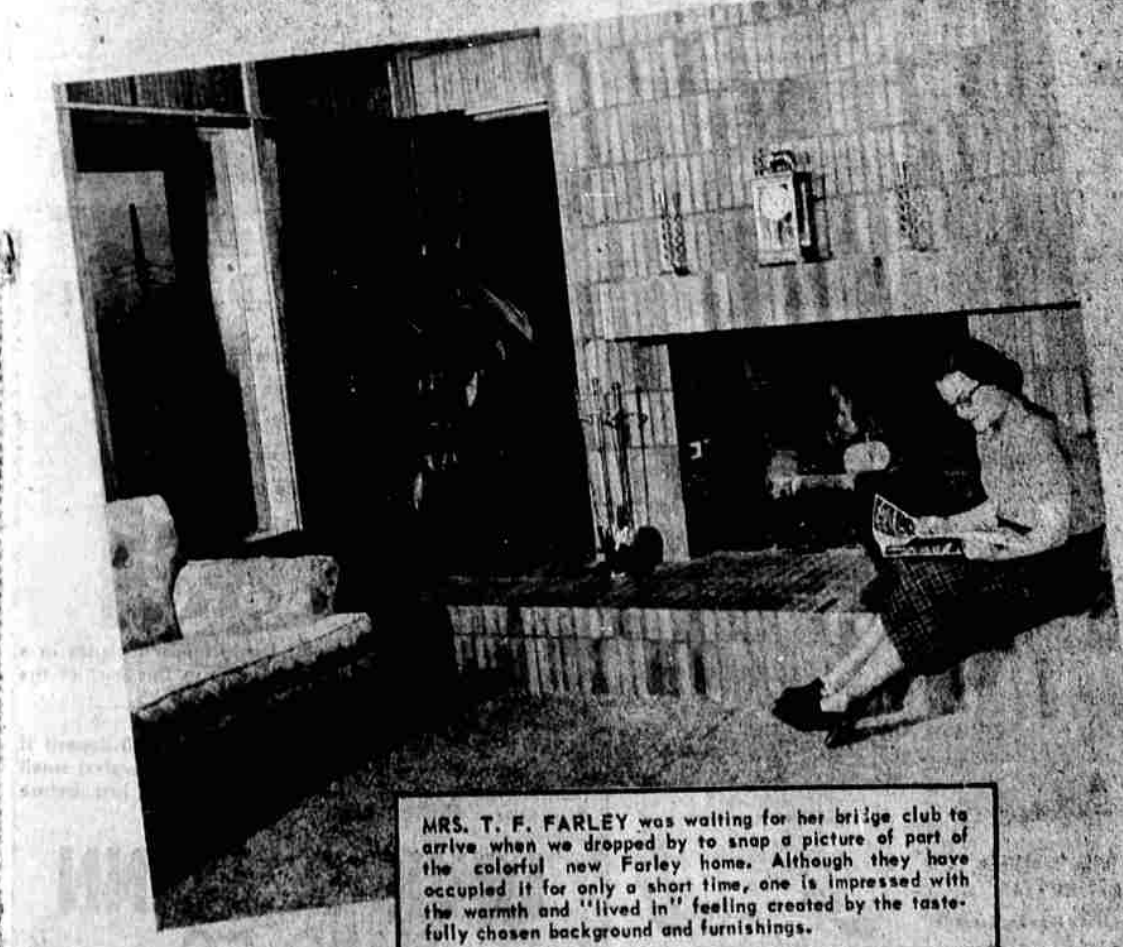
