CDA HISTORY

"Realizing the necessity for such an organization on the West coast, a group of Catholic women in Eugene set up plans for the first Catholic Daughters of America court west of the Rockies. This was forty two years ago. The mother organization was born at the start of the century in New York, as a civic and religious order, with unity, charity and patriotism the motto."

Thus did Mrs. Lorraine Huettl begin her talk on the history of the Catholic Daughters at the November 12 meeting in the local parish hall. Mrs. Huettl's history of the order was prepared primarily for the benefit of the recent class of candidates, this having been their first regular meeting after initiation.

Court Klamath 1295 was officially chartered in October 1930 with 76 members and Mrs. Mildred Smith the first grand regent. The present enrollment is 274 but in the entire state there are 21 courts with over 2500 members.

Mrs. Lily Fee, grand regent, presided at the last meeting during which a vote was concluded to have only one December meeting, the second Monday, combining social and business activities.
