Merrill Cop Post Open

MERRILL — Appointment of a new police chief, on a trial basis, is expected to be made sometime this week, Mayor Frank Trotman said today.

Since the discharge of Chief Floyd Walker several days ago, Ex-Police Chief Max Hartlerode has been acting chief.

Walker was let out following a Tulelake tavern melee which resulted in the chief's being jailed and fined for disorderly conduct.

Hartlerode, beginning in the early 20's, served as chief for 12 years. He was also constable during four years of his term.

Mayor Trotman said some five or six persons had applied for the job. Hartlerode said he would not accept a permanent appointment.

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Is This a Nation Under God? National Council of Churches Invites Answers

ATLANTA, (AP)—The nation under God or is it? Ernest J. Arnold proposed to find out if he could.

Arnold, southeastern director of the National Council of Churches, long ago concluded that the time is past when Christians will be satisfied with sermonized platitudes and ancient cliches.

His opportunity came when the National Council of Churches set up a convocation for November 21-29 here for 10 Southern states.

To 800 lay and church leaders representing 15 Protestant denominations, Arnold wrote a letter the gist of which was "What's on your mind?"

He invited them to the convocation, designed originally as a simple get-together, and said he would build the program around their answers.

EVIDENCE
 Out of the flood of answers came almost conclusive evidence that Protestants at mid-century are worried; that they feel the world of Christ is slipping away while they stand by helplessly.

Many feel that the time has come to do the role of the apostles and seek to restore to its former glory the philosophy often described as the highest moral plane ever reached by man.

Wrote Holmes Rolston, editor in chief for the board of education, Presbyterian Church in the United States, Richmond, Va., "The one thing I would like to see us do is to come to grips with the problems which actually face our world that the church may be the medium of the world which is vital and relevant to the times which are before us."

The great danger before the church today is that she shall not speak with authority and that she will have nothing relevant to say concerning the great issues which must be decided in our time.

RIGHTS
 "I am thinking particularly of segregation, of the rights of labor, of the very poor to a fair share of the fruits of industry, and of the rights of the underprivileged and exploited peoples all over the world to freedom and human dignity."

An Atlanta layman, G. B. Stricker, also a Presbyterian, said, "The crying need for protestantism to-

day is for a means of developing real spirituality, a spirituality that transcends denomination, race and class."

A Fairmont, W. Va., churchwoman said she was concerned with the indifference of people, their failure to put first things first, their refusal to accept leadership.

E. M. Fossett, Ashland, Ky., a layman, suggested that "the convocation face fearlessly the hypothetical policies of our national leaders who mouth pious platitudes, while they perform impious deeds."

So went the answers, covering practically every aspect of church and political life. Arnold has set up symposiums to let people thrash out in the open their beliefs and, perhaps, even hammer out a program.

REPRESENTATIVES
 The national council is made up of 29 denominations, but does not include Southern Baptist and the Roman Catholic church, both of which have refused to join the movement.

The current president is the Right Rev. Henry Kieffer, Episcopalian. One of the vice-presidents is Harold E. Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania.

Bus Driver Blameless In Accident

City bus driver Ernest Bussey, charged following a Saturday evening bus-car collision that hospitalized one man, was absolved of blame in a city police court hearing late this morning.

The accident occurred when the city bus was hit head-on by a car at S. 6th and Shasta way a few minutes after seven Saturday evening.

A passenger in the car, Eli Aaland, 55, Los Angeles, suffered a deep cut over his left eye. At the hospital today his condition was reported as good.

The collision occurred as the bus was turning from S. 6th into Shasta way. Bus driver Bussey said he had already cut across the left traffic lanes when he noticed the car traveling toward the city was apparently not going to stop. He said he stopped the bus and the car crashed into the front of the bus.

The car was driven by Bill Haynes, 22, Tulelake, son-in-law of the injured man, Aaland.

Haynes was shaken up and bruised. The bus company said no passengers were injured.

City police, investigating the mishap, cited the bus driver for failure to yield right-of-way. But this morning Municipal Judge Robert Eldred found the bus driver not guilty.

A second citation grew out of the accident. Hilding C. Nelson, 55, 5147 Cottage, was charged with drunk driving by Officer Carl Kelley, investigating the bus-car collision, narrowly escaped being hit by Nelson's car as Nelson drove up to the accident scene. Nelson posted \$100 bail.

Another drunk driving charge was lodged Saturday night against William G. Simon, 42, 2162 Radcliffe. City police made the charge after Simon's car struck a pickup at E. Main and Home. The pickup was driven by Clarence C. Baely, 2154 Eberlein. Police said Simon's car was on the wrong side of the street when the collision occurred.

In police court this morning, Simon pleaded not guilty and requested a jury trial.

Non-Support Charge Levied

Marvin Lee Connor, 28, Jola, Kan., held in the city jail the past 13 days on a vagrancy conviction, is registered today at the county jail.

He is held on charge of non-support of a minor child.

Connor waived preliminary hearings in the charge late Saturday morning and is held in lieu of \$2500 bail.

He was arrested on a warrant by Sheriff Jack Franey.

Road Death Trial Opens

Trial of Sanford LeRoy Henderson, 32-year-old, Reedsport, resident on a charge of negligent homicide got off to a slow start this morning in circuit court.

Henderson is accused of negligent driving resulting in an auto accident on Oregon 66 near King Cole in which Mrs. Frank Hibbs, 56, of Jacksonville, Ore., was fatally injured.

He pleaded not guilty, and is free on \$5000 bond.

The accident occurred last August 31. Henderson and his family were driving toward Medford, going home to Reedsport after a vacation trip to Arkansas. Mrs. Hibbs was riding in a car driven by her son-in-law, Frank E. McElfresh, Cloverdale.

Henderson is accused of attempting to pass another car on the crest of a hill, and driving his car head-on into the McElfresh vehicle.

He is defended by attorney U. S. Balentine.

The regular jury panel was exhausted this morning and a special venire of seven was summoned.

Questioning of prospective jurors was continuing this afternoon. Veniremen questioned and excused this morning included Hartley Goeller Jr. and F. W. Eberlein, challenge; George Filtrcraft and Mildred Campbell, by defense peremptory; and George E. Horn by prosecution peremptory.

School Boards To Meet Tonight

A special joint meeting of the high school and elementary school boards has been called for tonight, 7:30, at the high school.

City School Supt. Arnold Gralapp said the meeting was called because of cancellation of last month's regular meetings.

He said there was nothing of unusual importance on tonight's agenda and the meeting was necessary because of an accumulation of routine business.

Diplomat Denies Communist Label

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Career diplomat John Carter Vincent is pressing congress for an immediate chance to deny publicly and under oath that he is or ever was a Communist.

The state department disclosed this yesterday by making public a letter Vincent wrote Nov. 9 to Chairman McCarran (D-Vt.) of the senate internal security subcommittee probing for any subversive influences on Far East policies.

Vincent requested a hearing before congress, when he is due to return to his diplomatic post at Tangier. He described as "false testimony" a statement made to the committee by ex-Communist Louis Budenz recently.
