Church Hits Vatican Post

HOLLYWOOD, (AP)—Methodist Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam predicts the senate will refuse to confirm the appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican.

Oxnam, president of the world council of churches, addressed a Methodist rally in Hollywood Bowl last night. Ministers of 162 Methodist churches in the Los Angeles area approved a resolution condemning the appointment.

Oxnam told a news conference that President Truman promised him personally in 1948 that he would never name an ambassador to the Vatican.

"The real issue," said Oxnam, "is clericalism—the pursuit of power, especially political power, by a religious hierarchy, carried on by secular methods, for purposes of social domination."

"It is impossible to distinguish between Pacelli the prelate and Pacelli the politician."

He apparently referred to Pope Pius XII, formerly Cardinal Eugenio Pacelli.

Atomic Tests On A-Train in Nevada

LAS VEGAS, Nev.—Barring a last minute change in the weather, the atomic energy commission resumes its fall series of atomic test explosions today.

There was speculation that the blast will be set off underground. An AEC spokesman would neither confirm nor deny this. Observers here for the five blasts between Oct. 22 and Nov. 5 understood that an underground detonation would be part of the "second phase" experiments. The five blasts in the first phase were either aerial or tower shots.

The new series was to have begun last week but unfavorable weather conditions caused them to be postponed. The weather today was clear with light breezes.

Scuffle Leads To Fatal Shot

OPELOUSAS, La.—A Negro seeking federal court action for the right to vote was shot to death during a fight with a deputy sheriff.

Sheriff Clayton Guilbeau identified the man as John Lester Mitchell, 33, and said he was shot by Deputy Sheriff David Lenclos yesterday.

Guilbeau said the shooting occurred this way: Lenclos, assigned to keep order in Negro night spots, found Mitchell "acting rowdy and out of control" at "The Chicken Shack." He ordered Mitchell to leave.

A scuffle occurred. Lenclos, the sheriff said, fearing he was about to be overpowered, drew his revolver and fired.

An inquest was ordered for Wednesday by Coroner Gerald Bertinot.

Mitchell and two other Negroes recently filed suit in U.S. District Court here asking that George Blanchard, registrar of voters, be required to allow them to vote. They claimed they were denied registration solely because of their race and contended they were being denied civil rights guaranteed under the U.S. constitution.

The suit was scheduled for hearing before U.S. District Judge Gaston L. Porter on Nov. 29.
