For 'em or against 'em, the entire Northwest should be willing today to suit a short verse of "Bow Down to Washington." The Huskies of Howie Odell are the only players in this area able to pull even a slight crimp in the football surge of California's coast conference teams.

The Northern Division Saturday was featured by an "almost" a "nearly" and a "near."

Washington came from behind in Los Angeles to tie the UCLA Bruins 20-20, almost giving the North its only victory over the South this season. Everywhere Oregon nearly tripped top heavily favored California before bowing 28-26.

The neat job was Washington State's 47-10 decision over Montana, in which end Ed Barker wrapped up two more Pacific Coast conference passes, receiving records. His seven catches boosted his total for the season to 40 for a total of 73 yards, breaking two records checked up last year by Stanford's Bill McColl.

SPOTLIGHT
Gary Kerkerian took the spotlight away from McColl as he quarterbacked Stanford to a 35-14 decision over Oregon State, all but clinching the Rose Bowl bid for the unbeaten Indians. Should they lose this week to California they still would be favored, as Stanford has shipped the other chief contender, Southern California.

Idaho, which evidently fired its best shots at WSC a week earlier, was upset by Arizona 13-6 in a game at Tucson. An intercepted pass by Walter Dell set up the touchdown that saved the Vandals from a shutout. An interception by Arizona on its own two halted a drive that could have given Idaho 118 points.

Scoring all his team's points, Hurryin' Hugh McElhenney again was the hottest cog in the Washington machine. His outburst ran his scoring total to 118 for the season to leave him well in front in the conference tally chase.

UCLA countered first and McElhenney countered at once with a 48-yard whack, then kicked the point that tied the score at 7-7. Sophomore Paul Cameron, star of the Bruin show, scored on a short plunge to give his team a 13-7 halftime edge and Washington tied it up in the third stanza on a short McElhenney plunge after Jim Wiley had intercepted a UCLA pass.

The Bruins marched 79 yards to crack the deadlock, Cameron passing to Ike Jones for the fourth-quarter score. Washington got the equalizer with a 59-yard thriller. Sam Mitchell lofted a pass which caromed off Bill Earley's fingers.

3 Pels Eye SOCE Berths

Three Klamath Falls students at Southern College are trying for berths on the Red Raider basketball team this season, reports Coach Ted Eckhart. Thirty-one men answered the initial call for practice recently and will begin drills in earnest Monday, Nov. 19.

Jerry Overen, Morris Jimenez and Ron Wilkerson are former Pelicans who will compete for places with the varsity team. Losing 12 men from the 1950-51 squad, Eckhart says this may have to be a building year as only four lettermen have returned.

The Raiders have scheduled a 26-game season, opening December 7 at Ashland when Southern Oregon will host Oregon Technical Institute. SOCE is a member of the Far Western conference which includes the basketball powerhouses of Chico State, Humboldt State and the Col Aggies.
