Coach Skeet O'Connell of Oregon Tech is somewhat on the solemn side when talking about his 1951-52 basketball team.

But nobody—particularly your writer—knows why.

Because Skeet has four of last year's five regulars back in the cage swim, including Don Sutphin, leading Oregon Collegiate conference scorer last season.

The others are Homer Duncan, Mary Hammack and Jack Pinkley.

FOUR OF FIVE — This represents four of the five regulars that last year placed second in the OCC and finished with an over-all 14-12 record.

The fifth man in the starting five could well be Wayne Holzfuss, ex-Lebanon high school boy who was an all-state player last year.

Holzfuss is being groomed for the center spot. Sutphin and Hammack are guards. Pinkley and Duncan are forwards.

FOREMAN BACK — Al Foreman, speed-boy on last year's jayvee squad, will be on hand.

Other promising cagers now working out with the Owls are Jim Patterson, St. Helen's; Mel Brown and John Koch, Grants Pass; Tom Humphrey, Marshfield; Jim McGregor, Yreka, and Larry Terlinier, Bend.

MAY ENROLL — Bob Erlandson, ex-KUHS star, may enroll on the mile-high campus and cast his lot with the basketball team.

O'Connell has less than two weeks to get his boys ready for the season opener here Nov. 30 and Dec. 1 against Lasen Junior college.

The Owls have a 28-game schedule, 12 of them conference games—four each against Oregon College, Vanport and Eastern Oregon.

Klosterman Tops Heinrich's Mark — Pasadena, Calif. — Don Klosterman's collegiate record of 134 completed passes in a season lasted only for a year.

Cagers Get Jail Terms

NEW YORK, (AP)—Charging that an "evil system of commercialism" has corrupted college sports programs, a judge yesterday sentenced five former basketball players and a master briber to jail.

He suspended sentence on nine other players.

Gambler Salvatore T. Solazzo, who feasted and bribed players on a lavish scale to rig game scores, received an eight to 16 year prison term for bribery.

Edward Gard, a former Long Island university player who plotted with Solazzo to fix games, drew an indeterminate term of up to three years for conspiracy.

A one-year penalty was meted out to Sherman White, former LTU star, and six months each to Edward Warner and Alvin Roth, of City College of New York, and Harvey "Connie" Schaff, of New York university.

Judge Aims Blast At Football, Basketball

NEW YORK, (AP)—Some college athletic leaders were quick today to refute a New York judge's accusation that football and basketball are sordid big business deals.

But a committee of seven college presidents, meeting in Washington, agreed "something must be done" to remove whatever evils are in the intercollegiate athletic program.

CONTROL — And in Chicago, Hugh Wullett, president of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, said a substantial majority of the organization's 320 members supported a 15-point program for tighter controls on college athletics.

Basketball and football came under the fire of general sessions Judge Saul B. Streit in a 41-page statement issued yesterday shortly before the judge sentenced a basketball fixer and five former players, from three New York universities to prison terms and gave nine other ex-players suspended sentences.

"Commercialism and over-emphasis in intercollegiate football and basketball are rampant throughout the country," said Judge Streit.

Judge Streit singled out Oklahoma, Texas, Texas A. & M., Southern Methodist, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Maryland and Kentucky as examples of over-emphasis in football. Kentucky is the only one of the group involved in the basketball point-fixing scandal that has reached more than 30 players from seven schools and a referee.

The judge called a college athlete a paid commercial and said academic standards for athletes are a laugh.

Major League Draft Anemic; Bevans Sold

CINCINNATI, (AP)—A brisk trading winter was predicted today as a result of yesterday's "lean pickin'" in the annual major league draft that brought promotion to only 17 minor league players, the lowest number in years.

E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi, effervescent vice president of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who has spent practically every waking hour of the two days that he's been here talking over possible deals with rival club representatives, didn't bother to conceal his pleasure and relief over the termination of the draft.

"Maybe now we can settle down and do some business among ourselves," he signed. "I've talked with every National League club and some in the American. They were all anxious to do business, the same as I was. But they preferred to wait until the draft was over."

11 OF 16 — Only 11 of the 16 big league clubs participated in the draft. The busiest bargain hunters were the Cincinnati Reds and Chicago Cubs who selected three players each.

The biggest name of the lot was Floyd (Bill) Bevans, former star right-hander of the Yankees. Bevans, shunted to the minors in 1948 because of a "dead" arm, gave evidence of complete recovery with a 20-12 record at Salem (Ore.) in the Class B Western International league. He was picked by the Reds.

Bevans, the hardluck pitcher of the 1947 World Series, was the first western International league player drafted by the major leagues.

TO TIGERS — Alex Garbowsky, shortstop for the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast league, went to the Detroit Tigers.

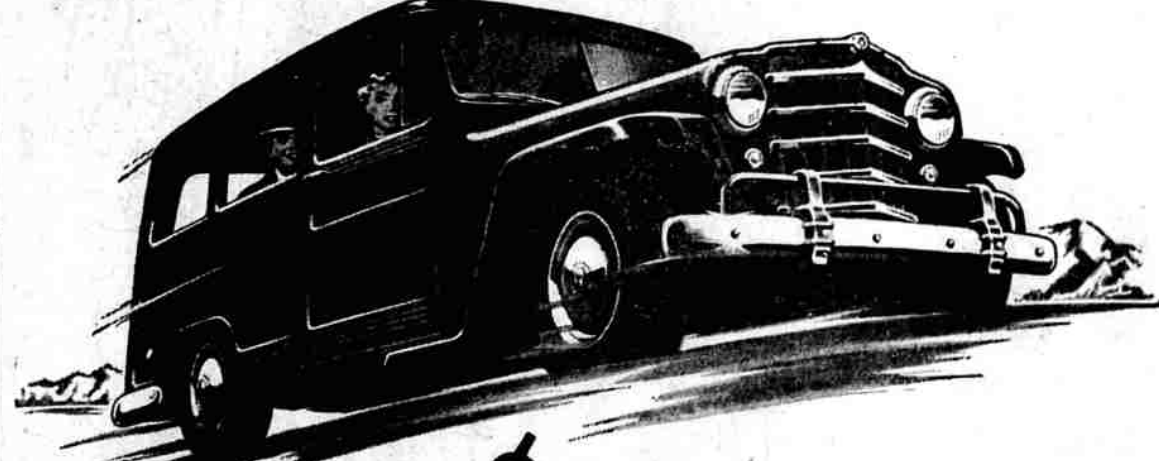
The New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals, who had been on the verge of announcing a player swap a week ago but called it off at the last minute, were trying to pick up where they left off and may announce a trade soon. Another possible trade, still in the talking stage, involved shortstop Roy Smalley of the Cubs and first baseman Earl Torgeson of the Boston Braves.

GIVE UP — A spokesman of the New York Yankees said the world champions had just about given up hopes of acquiring ace Ned Garver from the St. Louis Browns.

"They (The Browns) simply want too much," he said. "We are not going to break up our club just to get one player, no matter how good he is."

Paul Richards of the Chicago White Sox, most active manager in the trade mart a year ago, said he was ready to "talk shop with anybody," but was disappointed by the absence of any of the top officials of the Cleveland Indians and Boston Red Sox.

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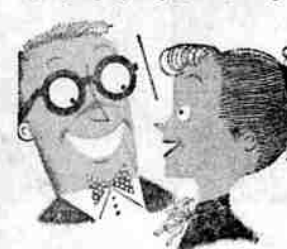
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
