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Indian Is Speaker At YMCA Here

By MALCOLM EPLEY, Jr. A short, thin brown man from India, Victor Pavamani, told some 60 persons last night at the YMCA that "the glory of my country is not in its past, but in its future." Pavamani, a student at the University of Washington, and has been studying in the U. S. for two years. He has taught in an Indian college—instructing English literature—and though his accent was Asiatic, his emphasis on his words was more Western. Speaking on three phases of Indian society, he explained the dangers of communism in his country; he explained that the notorious caste system had been banned by law by the new Indian government set up when the British gave India her freedom in 1947, and he explained that only 15 percent of the people of India are literate. During his talk, Pavamani spoke again and again of Mahatma Gandhi, India's emancipator, who "led 400 million people from bondage to freedom with the weapon of non-violence."

U.S. Catholics Lash Out At Moral Decay In America

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The spiritual leaders of American Catholics have spoken out strongly against "moral corruption" among government officials—and against the burning of false charges at men in public life. The U.S. cardinals, archbishops and bishops of the Roman Catholic church said in their annual statement that this country faces a threat alarmingly like the one which caused the downfall of the Roman empire—"barbarism on the outside, refined materialism and moral decay within." "The Roman empire disintegrated from within," said the statement, issued over the weekend after the prelates' three-day conference here. "The same fate will befall us if we do not awaken to the danger which threatens us from within our own household." Appealing for a nation-wide return to "the wisdom of our founding fathers—a wisdom which proclaimed God's rightful place in human affairs," the churchmen said: "In politics, the principle that 'anything goes,' simply because people are thought not to expect any high degree of honor in politicians, is grossly wrong. "We have to recover that sense of personal obligation on the part of the voter and that sense of public trust on the part of the elected official which give meaning and dignity to public life." Public officials, the church leaders said, "have been selected not for self-enrichment but for conscientious public service. . . One and the same standard covers stealing from the cash register and dishonest gain derived from public office." Also on the subject of government officials, the churchmen said: "In their speech and in their actions they are bound by the same laws of justice and charity which bind private individuals in every other sphere of human activity."

Mrs. Harold Wimer, chest drive chairman in Fort Klamath, advised headquarters this morning that the quota of \$38,000 had been met and exceeded by \$2,37. Mrs. Wimer's collections have now totaled \$352,37, and several ranchers are yet to be contacted in that area.

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Kidnap Trial Set Dec. 31

SACRAMENTO, (AP)—Two 17-year-old youths will face trial here December 31 for a second time on a charge of kidnaping an Oregon truck driver. The youths, Buford F. Faust and William C. England, both from St. Paul, Minn., are accused of forcing James R. Edwards, the truck driver, to drive them from Klamath Falls to Dorris. They had met Edwards in Medford and hitchhiked in his truck to Klamath Falls. Their first trial ended November 9 with a deadlocked jury. Yesterday Federal Judge Dal M. Lemmon set their new trial date.

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Circus Goes Into Winter Quarters

SARASOTA, Fla., (AP)—The Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus went into winter quarters here today after an eight month coast-to-coast tour. The big top wound up the 17,265 mile trip with a performance before the homefolks last night for the benefit of the Sarasota municipal hospital. It was the first time in 25 years the circus has put on a regular show for Sarasota, accustomed to seeing the acts as they are developed each spring. Officials reported the circus played to about 4,000,000 persons in 410 performances in 37 states.

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Couple Face Jail In Child Neglect

PORTLAND, (AP)—Fines of \$1000 each and sentences of one year in the county jail yesterday were meted to a Portland couple whose 4-month-old daughter was found at home alone. The sentences were held in abeyance, however, pending investigation by juvenile court authorities. The couple, Donald B. Speer, 34, and his wife, Patricia, 27, were charged with leaving their daughter alone in their one-room home Sunday night. Police, called by neighbors, said they found gas leaking from a kitchen stove burner. The child suffered no apparent ill effects. She has been placed in a nursery.

Man Killed On Highway

TULELAKE — A man identified as Harold J. Johnson, about 60, was killed instantly last night when hit by a car as he walked down the highway about two miles south of here. According to the highway patrol office, Johnson was walking down the center of the southbound lane, and was struck from behind by an auto driven by Pat Baker, 17. The body was hurled about 50 feet along the frosty pavement by the impact, an investigating officer said. Johnson died of multiple skull fractures. The body was turned over to the deputy Modoc county coroner and sent to Alturas.

Tractor Upset Kills Etna Man

YREKA—Kenneth Veril Main, 19, Etna, was killed instantly Friday when a tractor overturned while he was skidding logs. Main's head was crushed. He was thrown from the tractor when he attempted to run it over a stump. It was the first Scott valley accident of the season.
