Dope Peddlers Snagged by Cops

NEW YORK, (AP)—Detectives of the narcotics squad rounded up 13 persons Monday night and Tuesday in Harlem raids.
Police said two of those arrested sold narcotics from their apartment to addicts who blew toy whistles from the street to signal they wanted to buy dope.
The two were identified by police as Nathaniel Phillips, 26, and his brother, David, 26. They and the others arrested are Negroes.
Detectives said 21 teenagers went to the Phillips apartment last night to buy dope but were turned away by the raiding police. All those arrested were booked on charges of selling narcotics.

Baby Born To Mother With Polio

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Mrs. Lillian Hopper, 38, a polio victim, was back in her iron lung today after having given birth to a 5 pound, 14 ounce daughter.
Physicians at general hospital yesterday reported the birth was normal and the child unaffected by polio. During the birth, physicians said, the mother was kept alive for 30 minutes with a positive respirator, a temporary substitute for a paralyzed lung.
Mrs. Hopper and her husband, Herbert D. Hopper, 41, have a boy of seven. Mrs. Hopper has been in a respirator since last August 16.

"America's Sweetheart" To Return To Film Role

NEW YORK, (AP)—Mary Pickford, once known as "America's sweetheart," is coming out of a 19-year retirement from the screen to star in just one more film.
The 58-year-old actress will play the role of a librarian in the film, "The Librarian," to be made by Columbia pictures.
Her return to the screen matches in many ways the movie comeback of another early Hollywood queen, Gloria Swanson.
Miss Swanson, now 52, regained her former prominence last year with the film, "Sunset Boulevard." She went on to further successes on the stage and in television.
The careers of both actresses ran almost parallel. Miss Swanson started her film career in 1913. Miss Pickford in 1914. Miss Swanson appeared in only two films after 1932. Miss Pickford's last film, "Secrets," was made in 1933.
But unlike Miss Swanson, Miss Pickford indicated yesterday that "The Librarian" would not be followed by further roles. She said in a statement released by Columbia pictures that it "is the one and only story which would have induced me again to appear before the cameras."
Miss Pickford declined to give further details on the film.
Since her retirement from acting, Miss Pickford has continued to be active in the management and ownership phases of the film industry. She was one of the founders of the United Artists producing and distributing organizations.
The Canadian-born actress started her stage career at 5 and made her first film in 1909 at the age of 16. But the real start of her movie career dates from the 1914 film, "Hearth's Adrift."
Her other silent film successes, which led to her title as "America's Sweetheart," included "Tess of the Storm Country," 1922; "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm," 1917; "Poor Little Rich Girl," 1917; and "Little Lord Fauntleroy," 1921.
In 1929, Miss Pickford cut off her famous curls and started making talkies. These included "Coquette," "The Taming of the Shrew," and "Kiki."
At the height of her career, the star once was guaranteed \$250,000 a picture. But she turned down the offer, preferring to work for her own company, United Artists.
Miss Pickford married her one-time leading man, Buddy Rogers, in 1937. Rogers is now conductor of his own television show.
Previously she was married to Owen Moore and Douglas Fairbanks Sr.

The AJC claims a paid membership of 60,000 Jewish laymen. Its affiliated organizations have 1,200,000 members throughout the nation.
At the close of the AJC biennial convention Monday, a resolution was adopted urging President Truman to recall his proposed appointment of Gen. Mark Clark, "in the interests of fundamental American democratic principles."
Scattered opposition was registered in the vote that followed a heated debate.
