NCAA Eyes 'Straitjacket' For College Sports Overemphasis

CHICAGO (AP)—A straitjacket for overemphasis of collegiate sports has been devised by the NCAA policy-making council for national adoption. Rigid controls that would strengthen academic standards, provide an antidote for professionalism, combat recruiting, and in general, put a lid on pressures to win at any cost, were drafted by the all-powerful council after a two-day session. The council ordered a moratorium throughout 1952 on contractual commitments for post-season events such as Bowl games. A special study will be made to determine the degree of pressure post-season sports, especially Bowl games, creates in the build-up of overemphasis. A 12-point reform program will be submitted to the NCAA convention in Cincinnati January 9-12.

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Detroit Lions Seek 4 in Row

DETROIT, (AP)—The Detroit Lions will try to extend their current victory string to four straight in their National pro football league Thanksgiving Day game with Green Bay's Packers here tomorrow. A victory over the Packers would put Coach Buddy Parker's Lions into a first-place tie with Los Angeles and the Chicago Bears in the league's National conference.

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
