## Skipper Up For Killing Aboard Ship

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP) — Capt. Franklin B. Weaver, skipper of the Flying Trader, faces coast guard charges of "wrongfully killing" one of his crew members at sea.

Lesser charges of assault and battery and "improper treatment of a crew member" were added.

The husky 39-year-old skipper from Englewood, N. J., pleaded innocent to all counts. If convicted, his merchant marine officer's license would be revoked or suspended. The charges are not criminal.

The charges were filed yesterday after a preliminary investigation. The freighter, owned by Isbrandtsen Lines, arrived Monday.

The crew member, William Harvey, 24, a Negro steward of Dayton, O., was shot to death while the Flying Trader was at sea between Kobe and Manila.

The company said Weaver shot Harvey in self defense.

The first assistant engineer, George N. Wood, testified yesterday he saw Weaver appear on deck October 23 followed by Harvey with a pistol.

Wood said the captain took an automatic pistol from his cabin, cocked it and moved out of sight with Harvey.

Then Harvey shouted: "You put those handcuffs on me. Take 'em off!"

"I heard the first shot fired," Wood said. "Harvey passed my line of vision, still handcuffed, still demanding they be removed."

"I heard a second shot. I heard Harvey say: 'Go ahead, shoot me again!'"

"It was immediately followed by a third shot."

"The FBI is conducting a separate investigation."

## Kathryn Grayson "Free" For First Time In Years

 HOLLYWOOD, (AP) — "I'm free for the first time in my life," enthused Kathryn Grayson, her upward most tilted at a gay angle.

"How's that again?" I asked.

"It's true," she said. "This is the first time in my life I have been a free woman. When I was a girl, my main diversion was attending musicals. My father would pick me up promptly at 10 o'clock, when the musical was over. When my parents were away on a trip to North Carolina, I sneaked away and married John Shelton."

"That turned out to be an error, and then I got married again (to crooner Johnny Johnston). After much unhappiness—it's never easy to decide on a divorce, especially when a child is involved—we got a very Hollywood divorce; that is, we're still friends."

"Now I'm really living. The only trouble is that I've had two dates since the divorce and both men asked me to marry them. That's not the way I planned it."

Kathryn is delighting her intimates by blossoming out these days. They had been concerned about her unhappiness following the breakup with Johnston. Now she's full of plans for her own independence and that includes her film future.

Her long (13 years) film contract with MGM expires a year from January, a short period as movie deals go. She is willing to sign on again—on her own terms.

"I'm perfectly willing to work for MGM as a motion picture company," she remarked. "I would like to make movies for the studio, but that is all I want to have the right to do television, and I want to be able to make concert tours."

In the past, she has been unable to do concerts because the studio could not tell when she would be free from film schedules. She wants advance notice, so she will have time to line up singing dates. Furthermore, she added with refreshing candor, she wants to do concerts not for art or to reach the public. She's interested in the money.

It's hard to see how she'll have time for concerts this year. She is planning a trip to Mexico city, a possible overseas tour to entertain troops, a month's stay in New York for radio shows and then a tour of South America with the other stars of "Showboat."

Likewise her film schedule is loaded. She is now working in "Lovely to Look At" (a remake of "Roberta"), and future assignment is a musicalized "Goodbye, Mr. Chips." That would make three remakes in a row for her.

"Just call me Jeannette Irene Grayson," she said. "I'll be doing 'Naughty Marietta' next."

## U.S. Prisoners On Red Radio

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Moscow is using what it describes as testimony of American war prisoners to reply to U. S. charges of Communist atrocities in Korea.

One such prisoner was quoted in a broadcast recorded here as saying that he was better off in a North Korean camp than he was when unemployed in New York.

A long series of such statements, complete with names and addresses, has been beamed to the United States and other Western countries since Col. James M. Hanley of the eighth army made his estimate that about 5000 American prisoners have been slain by the North Koreans and the Chinese.

In an English language broadcast reported today by U. S. government monitors, one American prisoner was quoted:

"I am treated courteously and live in good conditions, get plenty to eat, and a daily supply of tobacco. When I was captured, my uniform was in shreds. Here in the camp, I was provided with new clothes. I now understand a good many things I did not understand; that the Koreans are humane and noble-hearted people."

The name and address of this prisoner and others were deleted from the record made public here by the government in accordance with a policy of protecting families and friends in this country.

## Coastal Shrimp Industry Eyed

PORTLAND, (AP)—Oregon coastal shrimps may provide the Pacific Northwest with an important commercial fishery.

That was the report yesterday of George Harry, biologist in charge of marine research, to the Oregon state fish commission.

Harry reported that in recent experimental expeditions off Depoe Bay as much as 10 pounds of shrimp were brought up in a single drag.

The pink shrimp are similar to those caught in Alaskan waters. The commission will continue research at Depoe Bay and off the mouth of the Columbia river next spring.

## Fog-Dispersal Unit Moved

PORTLAND, (AP)—United Air Lines has moved fog-dispersal tests to the Portland area for two weeks of experimenting with what two former navy fliers say is a real field-clearing chemical.

The tests have been made at intervals in the Medford area. There has been reports from there of fog moving out after the dispersal plane went aloft, but UAL officials today declined to comment on the success of the work thus far. They said only that it was inconclusive.

H. T. Harrison, UAL meteorologist is here from Denver for the tests, planned this week and next. In direct charge are the two ex-navy men, Harvey M. Brandau and Eugene K. Kooser of Medford, whose chemical, a secret "formula X" is diffused from equipment installed in one of the UAL planes. Right now they are waiting for fog.


The weather bureau's airport station said there hadn't been any here since last week when Gen. Douglas MacArthur's plane could not land for more than two hours. There might be some soon though, the forecasters reported.

Brandau and Kooser, experimenting since 1949 with weather control, engage in what they call hail dispersal as well as for dispersal work. Fruit men in the Medford area have contracted with them to break up clouds which carry potential hail damage.
