## Veteran Diver Has Close Call On Golden Gate Job

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Trapped almost five hours in icy ocean waters, William Wood directed his own rescue from one of his closest scrapes in years of deep-sea diving.

The 48-year-old Wood worked two ordinary auto jacks to lift iron bars that pinned him to the wreckage of a sunken barge near the Golden Gate.

Searchlights were played on the scene, 1/4 mile off Land's End, and scores watched from shore as Wood was lifted aboard his ship, the Salvager, at 7:30 last night.

Although he was rushed unconscious to a decompression chamber for treatment against the bends, Wood was found suffering only from shock and exposure.

He told reporters he had started salvage operations he thought might net him "some money for Christmas" for his wife and two daughters in Santa Barbara, Calif. He was seeking to recover brass and copper from a barge that sank off Land's End years ago.

About 2:30 p.m., the tide pushed iron bars over him and pinned his legs and feet. Wood was wearing full divers' equipment. He was 25 feet below the surface.

After an hour's struggle, he phoned the Salvager crew to send distress signals.

The coast guard brought the eight-pound jacks. They were lowered according to instructions from Wood. After hours of careful maneuvering, Wood dislodged the bars, only to be caught by other debris on the way up.

The veteran diver moved that and the crew hauled him up, taking 10 minutes because of the pressure difference.

This time, he added, "I thought scrapes I've ever had—no, not the worst," he said afterward. "I came closest to eternity off Africa once." He did not relate that experience.

This time, he added, "I thought I'd make it back up."

Wood said he has spent several years hunting for sunken ships from which to salvage metal fittings. Last summer he hunted for the wreckage of a Spanish ship which has been at the bottom of the ocean 356 years.

KLAMATH AGENCY—A special meeting of the Klamath Indian tribal council has been called for 10 a.m. next Thursday at the council hall here by S. E. Kirk, council president.

Matters up for discussion are:

1. Amendments or specific recommendations regarding the pending federal bill to allow members of the tribe to withdraw, so that a departmental report may be made to congress when it reconvenes next January.
2. Council action on the matter of state jurisdiction in lieu of federal jurisdiction as applicable and as authorized by the tribe and by congress.
3. Council action of concurrence of the tribe with the governor's convention approval of repeal of the federal Indian liquor prohibition.

## Timber Sale Battle Set

OREGON CITY, (AP)—A suit against the government designed to force distribution to 18 Oregon counties of about \$4,500,000 in federal funds has the support of Clackamas county.

The county court agreed to join Lane county in the suit over the funds from the sale of timber from Oregon and California lands in 18 western Oregon counties. County Judge W. R. Telford said.

A jurisdictional dispute between the forest service and the bureau of land management has resulted in the accumulation of the money since 1937, he said. Both agencies claim administrative jurisdiction over the timber.

County Commissioner Bob Jones said that a meeting of district attorneys and representatives of the 18 county courts soon would be called to try to determine a unified policy. Recently the Marion county court declined to join Lane county in the suit.

Jones said that most counties prefer administration by the bureau of land management. This is because the bureau would pay counties 75 percent of the money in lieu of taxes while the forest service would distribute only 25 percent less administrative expenses, he said. The percentage though has been subject of congressional talk and measures to reduce it to 50 percent are on file.
