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Road Shows Draw Blast From Movie Critic, Fans

 HOLLYWOOD, (P)—Glancing at the week's news in movietown: The president of the theater owners of America has declared that one of the biggest problems of film house owners today is "more and more shows." Some moviegoers are beginning to agree.
 In the Los Angeles area, for example, there are seven films being advertised at advanced prices. Patrons are forced to pay premium prices to see these pictures. Most of the films were made at average budgets, so it can't be argued that the upped scale is necessary to defray the cost.
 The principle of the road show has long been attacked by some observers who argue that movie patrons are expected to take the good with the bad throughout the year. Then, when a superior picture comes along, the patrons are required to pay extra for it.
 My, how times change. A couple of years ago, you would never expect the king of one studio and the queen of another to be off salary. But that's true. Both King Grable and Clark Gable are not drawing their weekly stipends from 20th-Fox and MGM, respectively.

Tax Stamp 'Not Needed'

SPOKANE, (P)—Mrs. Fannie Gormley, a widow of two months who has issued one of the first federal gambling tax stamps in eastern Washington, said she doesn't need it and doesn't want it.
 She said she didn't know what it was all about in the first place. Mrs. Gormley took over her husband's tavern at Wilbur in Lincoln county two months ago.
 "I thought I needed one of those stamps to operate the place just as I needed a beer license," she told a reporter. "I came to Spokane and asked a revenue man about it and he said I had to have one."
 Mrs. Gormley said there is no gambling in her tavern "except one of those spindle things you pull numbers from and I'm taking it out."
 The \$50 stamp is required under a new federal tax law on gambling and book making establishments. Mrs. Gormley was the first to apply here.
 "The publicity has done me harm," she said.

Robbers Loot Bank of \$62,000

KANSAS CITY, (P)—Two men robbed the Johnson County National Bank and Trust company at suburban Prairie Village, Kan., of an estimated \$62,000 Friday.
 Bank employees said the men knocked at the door just before opening time and asked to be let in. When the only employee in the bank refused to let them enter, the men pulled a gun and forced her to open the door.
 As employees entered, they were herded into the lobby.
 While one of the robbers, armed with a rifle, watched the employees, the other forced the cashier to open the vault.

US Steel To Dredge River Beds

NEW YORK, (P)—An agreement between the United States Steel Corp. and the Venezuelan government provides for a river-dredging operation which eventually will mean more iron ore for U.S. defense effort.
 The pact, announced yesterday, allows the company to dredge ship channels in the Macareo and Orinoco rivers to enable ocean-going vessels to bring out the ore from U.S. Steel's Venezuelan concession.
 The first shipment of iron ore via the ship channels will not be possible until early in 1954.
 Israel Mum On Soviet Warning
 TEL AVIV, Israel, (P)—A foreign office spokesman said today Israel will not make formal, written reply to the new Soviet note warning Middle Eastern countries away from the projected Mideast command of the Western powers.
 The spokesman said the Russian note was of a "declarative nature." There is a possibility, he added, that Israel's reaction may be given orally to Soviet diplomats here or in Moscow.

Australian Rainmakers Successful

PASADENA, Calif. (P)—Australian scientists have discovered a new and better way to produce rain artificially. The method is so surprisingly simple it's a wonder nobody thought of it before.

All they do is spray low hanging clouds with water. It's like fighting fire with fire—only with reverse English. And the system is so effective it takes merely one ton of water sprayed on the base of a rain cloud to produce one million tons of rain!
 Dr. E. G. Bowen, a physicist member of the Australian Commonwealth scientific and research organization, described the new technique yesterday in a speech at the California Institute of Technology. With it the Aussies hope to convert their vast desert into fertile farmlands.
 Up to now, clouds have been seeded with dry ice or silver iodide crystals to make it rain. Dr. Bowen said the water method is more effective, especially under conditions encountered in his country.

"It could carry five tons of water in a medium sized bomber," he explained. "That should be enough to make some 3 million tons of rainfall. But I wish to emphasize that thus far in our painstaking research we have used only a few hundred pounds of water at a time. We sprayed that from DC-3 airplanes."
 He said two more years of basic research may be necessary to learn all the facts and possibilities of the water spray system, but added:
 "Results of these experiments are most promising. I'm convinced that similar results could be obtained in the United States."
 He said the new technique works particularly well on warm, low hanging clouds characteristic of Australia and other South Pacific regions.

Reds May Get U.S. Pictures

BERLIN, (P)—Three American girls took it on themselves today to try to enlighten the Russians about the United States.
 The Longview, Wash., school girls sent their formula to the U.S. radio station RIAS in Berlin with a note saying:
 "We have taken pictures of parts of our town. We would appreciate it if you would send them in balloons to the USSR across the iron curtain."
 The signers were Julie Davis, Sharon Stuart and Jeanie Cox (of 22nd Ave.).
 Four scenes of urban and rural life, industry, education and the outdoors bore the inscriptions:
 "Free recreation," "schooling for everyone," "the right to live in the city or the country" and "the freedom to work."
 RIAS officials said they would do their best to carry out the assignment.

Wide Field Left In Part Time Work

WASHINGTON, (P)—The department of labor says U.S. employers "have little more than tapped the wide range of job skills and work experience" which could be supplied by women willing to work on a part-time basis.
 The department's women's bureau, in a report, said it had studied 3385 establishments in ten cities and that although all of them employed women as full-time workers, less than a third of them did so part-time.
 In the 1071 establishments which were employing women on short work weeks, the part-timers accounted for one-tenth of the total woman employment and were filling 80 different occupations, the bureau reported.
 The bureau surveyed establishments in San Francisco, Denver, Dallas, Des Moines, Milwaukee, Richmond, Va., Syracuse, N.Y., Providence, Worcester, Mass., and New York.

Baby Faced Narcotics Agent Breaks Dope Ring

WICHITA FALLS, Tex. (P)—A narcotics agent, barely out of his teens, yesterday broke up a major marijuana ring in Wichita Falls high school.
 Officers, holding a rendezvous in a secluded farm house to get their surprising orders, fanned out to arrest five men, two women and four high school students.
 Today, officers are still poring over lists of students allegedly believed to have purchased marijuana. Still others were to be questioned as possible suspects.
 Officers said arrests ranged from retailers to wholesalers.
 The narcotics agent, only 23, enrolled in the large high school two weeks ago.
 Since then, while posing to sellers as a high school boy, he purchased \$18,000 worth of the habit forming narcotic with marked bills.

SAN FRANCISCO, (P)—Dr. Lorne A. Tanner had many reasons to be thankful yesterday. More than 100 anonymous blood donors made it possible for his blood supply to be changed eight times during an operation.
 Doctors said 80 pints of blood were pumped into the 36 year old dentist's veins during an operation Sunday for internal hemorrhage. Additional transfusions used several more pints.
 Irwin Memorial blood bank officials said the amount of blood used set a record for one patient.
 The Tanner family is trying to replace the blood used through voluntary donors. Dr. Tanner's mother-in-law, Mrs. Natalie Holly, has provided them legal assistance.
