SALEM, (AP)—A heavy snowstorm was reported today in Santiam and McKenzie passes, causing the highway commission to warn motorists to use chains on those cross-Cascade routes.

The daily road report: Government Camp — Snowing lightly, slush, pack breaking up. Trace of new snow, 12 inches roadside snow.

Timberline — Snowing lightly, packed snow, plowing, carry chains. 6 inches new snow, 54 inches roadside snow.

Ochoco — Slush, pack breaking up. 3 inches new snow, 10 inches roadside snow.

Santiam Pass — Snowing hard and continuous, packed snow, plowing, carry chains. 1 inch new snow, 29 inches roadside snow.

McKenzie Pass — Snowing hard and continuous, packed snow, plowing, chains required. 3 inches new snow, 36 inches roadside snow.

Willamette Pass — Rain, slush, pack breaking up. 2 inches new snow, 25 inches roadside snow.

Chemult — Packed snow, plowing, carry chains. 4 inches new snow, 12 inches roadside snow.

Bly — Snowing lightly, 2 inches roadside snow.

Meacham — Packed snow, well sanded.

Seneca — Packed snow, plowing, chains required. 4 inches new snow, 10 inches roadside snow.

Burns — Packed snow, plowing, carry chains. 3 inches new snow, 3 inches roadside snow.

Weston-Elgin — Slush, pack breaking up. 3 inches new snow, 24 inches roadside snow.

Pavement bare on all other routes.

Strong Winds Batter State

PORTLAND, (AP)—Storm warnings as the weather bureau forecast continuing strong winds that whipped across western Oregon yesterday.

Winds up to 55 miles an hour were forecast by tonight, accompanied by occasional rain west of the Cascades. East of the mountains, showers or snow flurries and lower temperatures were expected.

The heavy blow yesterday toppled two big fir trees across highway 18, blocking the road to the Tillamook beaches for a time.

The wind reached 68 miles an hour at the airport in Astoria, and small boats were driven to shelter by the heavy seas.

The storm dumped 96 of an inch of rain on downtown Portland and smaller amounts elsewhere in western Oregon in the 24 hours ending this morning. Salem reported 39 and North Bend on the coast 81.

The weather bureau expected the wind to diminish by tomorrow.

Records indicate that windmills existed prior to the 12th century.

Persons in the truck, probably unaware of the mishap did not stop.

State police are investigating.

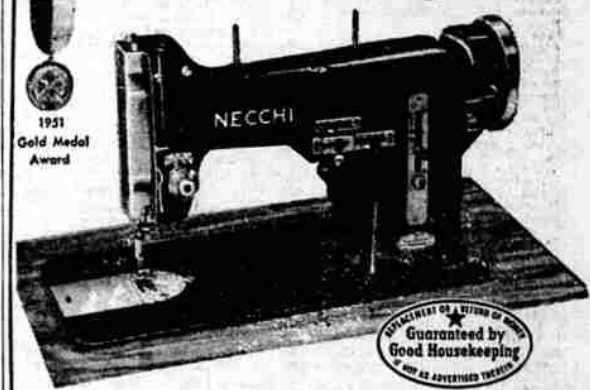
