

Stanford, Illinois in Rose Tilt

2 Bowls Set; Two Half Full

NEW YORK, (AP)—With the exception of the Army-Navy affair and a few scattered games across the country this week, the bowl season is closed today on the 1951 college football season.

The participants in two of the four major bowls have been decided, and one team has been selected for each of the other two. The consensus seems to be that the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans has the best teams for the annual New Year's Day games. The Rose Bowl probably will be next, followed by the Cotton and the Orange.

Unbeaten Tennessee, the nation's No. 1 team, and Maryland, currently ranked No. 4, collide in the Sugar Bowl and it should be a battle to see. On the basis of its stunning 20-0 victory over Kentucky Saturday, the Vols probably will play favorites.

Maryland, too, scored a thumping triumph, defeated West Virginia, 44-7. Both teams have been accused at various times of playing soft schedules, but they both hurdled every obstacle in their paths.

The Rose Bowl gets Illinois and Stanford, champions, respectively, of the Big Ten and Pacific Coast conferences. Neither outfit was expected to finish near the top before the season got under way. But as it progressed, it became more and more apparent that they were the teams to beat.

DIDN'T HURT California, the September favorite on the coast, finally did beat Stanford, 20-7 in the final game of the season for both schools. But it was too late to hurt the Indians in their quest for the title. However, it did put an end to Stanford's bid to end the season undefeated.

Illinois made it, but not by much. In fact, it was a field goal by Sam Rebecka in the 12-degree freeze of Evanston that enabled the Illini to defeat Northwestern, 3-0, and win the championship.

The Cotton Bowl will send Kentucky to battle the champion of the Southwest conference, which has not been decided. However, Texas Christian has the inside track at the moment. The Horned Frogs were another team overlooked in pre-season ratings. However, their 22-6 decision over Rice Saturday broke a first-place tie.

FAVORITES FALL But favorites all more often than they stand in the Southwest conference, and TCU still must play Southern Methodist, which dropped a 14-3 decision to Baylor. Texas still must play Texas A and M, and Baylor has a game with Rice. So it still could go almost any way.

Georgia Tech, which has been able to rest easy for the past two weeks, having been the first team selected for a major bowl assignment—the Orange—kept in fighting trim by downing Davidson, 34-7. The Engineers are marking time until their opponent is determined. It may turn out to be one of the Southwest conference teams or possibly Oklahoma, which wrapped up its fourth straight Big Seven title by polishing off Nebraska, 27-0.

NCAA Approves 10 Bowl Tilts

CHICAGO, (AP)—Marking the first effort to bring under control and inspection the mushrooming Bowl football games since the war, the National Collegiate Athletic association today officially approved 10 bowl contests.

Those certified as meeting NCAA requirements are the Sugar Bowl, New Orleans; Refrigerator, Evansville, Ind.; Rose, Pasadena, Calif.; Presidential Cup, Washington, D. C.; Gator, Jacksonville, Fla.; Orange, Miami, Fla.; Cotton, Dallas, Tex.; Sun, El Paso, Tex.; Salad, Phoenix, Ariz., and Pear Medford, Ore.

The Presidential Cup Bowl game recently was cancelled by the sponsoring American Legion.

Toole Gets Starting Assignment with OSC

The Northern division sports spotlight swings from football to basketball this week with the five member schools slated to see action in previews of their 1951-52 program.

The Tippy Dye-coached Washington Huskies, defending Pacific Coast conference champion, face probably the toughest opening assignment. The Huskies tackle the always-rugged University of Utah Redskins, runner-up in the 1950-51 conference last season, at Salt Lake City Friday and Saturday.

BEAVERS TRAVEL Oregon opens against the University of Portland at Portland the same night while Oregon State travels to Salem for a Saturday night game with Willamette. Idaho has two weekend home games on tap, against powerful Seattle University Friday and Gonzaga of Spokane Saturday. Seattle University moves to Pullman Saturday for the Washington State college opener.

All pre-season games are non-conference affairs. Returning lettermen will be in lineups of all Northern division schools, excepting Oregon, which also has a new coach in Bill Borchert. Bob Peterson is the only regular back from last year's Oregon squad. Other probable starters are Mel Broecker, forward; Chet Noe, center; Ken Hunt and either Ken Weener or Bud Covey, guards.

TOOLE IN Oregon State's lineup is expected to include lettermen Jack Orr, Jim Galt, Danny Johnston, as well as freshman Bill Toole, of Klamath Falls, Ore., and Bob Edwards, six-foot-six center.

The Washington Huskies, listed in pre-season ratings as one of the top teams in the nation, will have an all-veteran squad, including Frank Guiness and Duane Enochs at forward; Bob Houbregs, the hook-shot specialist at center; and Mike McEwen and Joe Cipriano at guard. Others named by Dye for the trip to Salt Lake City included veteran Doug McClary, Dean Parsons, much-heralded six-foot-seven-inch freshman from Eugene, Ore., and Chuck Koon, a junior college transfer.

TESTED The Huskies will face a team already tested in competition in the game at Salt Lake City. The Redskins defeated Montana State 52-43 in their season-opener last week.

Washington State and Idaho also are expected to have their hands full in tackling high-scoring Seattle University. The Chieftains, led by the O'Brien twins, Johnny and Ed, piled up the counters in two games last week. They defeated British Columbia 88-59 Friday and Western Washington college 90-39 Saturday.

Undeclared Number 17 NEW YORK, (AP)—The list of the nation's unbeaten, untied football teams today numbered 17 with all but one having completed their seasons.

Tennessee's Vols, who along with seven others have won nine games, has a chance to top the select group this week by beating Vanderbilt in their season's finale.

The unbeaten, untied list includes such major gridiron powers as Michigan State, Princeton and Maryland, each of which has won nine games. Stanford was the only major member lost by the group last week. The Indians bowed to California.

San Francisco was the only Western team to finish the season undefeated.

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Shaw Sets National Interception Record

A sturdy crop of seniors slowed their football gear for the final time today around the Northern division and none could be prouder than fullback Ray Hobbs of Washington State, who tied the three placekicks that brought a 27-23 victory Saturday over Washington in Seattle before a crowd of 52,000.

Others who made their goodbye games memorable were Hobbs' teammate Bud Roffler and Washington's All America candidate, Hurry! Hugh McElhenry.

But these veterans couldn't take all the play away from the rookies. In Eugene it was freshman George Shaw of Oregon who hit the glory road with the pass interception that gave him 13 for the year and a national record. Sophomore Jack Pinion of Washington tied the old mark, 12, held by Hank Rich of Arizona State, by grabbing two in Seattle.

RECORD Bob (The Iceman) Burkhardt, a WSC sophomore, calmly engineered the second-half drives in damp, 23-degree weather that damped the Cougars out of an 18-6 hole. He flipped three touchdown passes, boosting his season total to 15 for a conference record.

Big Ed Barker caught seven of the Burkhardt heaves—two for touchdowns—while his season's catches to 47 and another conference mark.

pasadena, Tyler In Junior Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Two unbeaten eleven, Tyler, Tex. JC and Pasadena City college, will lock horns here December 8 in the sixth annual Junior Rose Bowl game.

That these teams will supply the hostilities comes as no surprise, but an announcement committee makes it official. Tyler is rated number one in the National junior college rankings, Pasadena second.

Both squads have rolled over 10 opponents this season with Tyler piling up 413 points and yielding 134. Pasadena, scoring 318 points to 64 for its foes, has one game left on its schedule—a breather against East Los Angeles this Friday night. That game, however, will have no bearing on the Bowl situation.

The Junior Rose Bowl game, which professes to produce the National champion two-year college eleven, functions as a sort of warm-up for the big one here on New Year's day, Long Beach, Calif., won it last year by 33-13 over Boise, Ida.

As for the "gift" touchdown which caused such a furor last year when Washington tied WSC score so it could get the ball back, Coach Forest Evashevski of the Cougars said his team had no intention of replying in kind, even if the opportunity had arisen. He tabbed McElhenry a better runner than Tommy Harmon, who was Evashevski's teammate at Michigan.

Hobbs got his big chance when sophomore fullback Jim Head was benched by flu. The senior played nearly the whole game and took over the kicking chore after Roffler tried and missed the first conversion.

His best effort of the day was a knifing 51 yard run over left tackle, winding up on the WSC seven and setting up the Huskies' first touchdown.

It was the long run of the day. Roffler was the chief running threat for the Cougars, picking up sizeable gains on end runs. Another WSC senior, Byron Bailey, was a steady gainer and turned in a key block while Roffler was touchdown-bound with a Burkhardt pass.

FIRST SCORE Roffler also counted the first Cougar touchdown on a short plunge. Doug McClary caught two touchdown passes tossed by Washington's Sam Mitchell and Dick Sprague got another. McElhenry scored on a plunge after his long run.

Back from his tour of Japan, and with a good sleep behind him, O'Doul was ready to take it all in good spirits and that is exactly how he did it. No complaints, no regrets, at least on the surface.

"I feel I leave the club with a good record behind me. Few if any managers ever sent up one or more players every year to the majors as I did. I gave my best and now it's all over."
