Slot Operators Up On Tax Count

PORTLAND, (AP)—Lester J. Beckman and Robert J. Allan, both of Portland, pleaded guilty yesterday to charges of trying to avoid paying \$157,625 in federal income taxes.

A number of slot machines, which the government said the pair owned, were seized earlier by the internal revenue collector who reported Beckman and Allan owed \$997,457 in income taxes for the years 1940 through 1946.

They attempted to change an earlier plea of innocent to nolo contendere (no contention) when they appeared in federal court yesterday. But Judge James Alger Fee denied the plea. They then pleaded guilty.

The probation officer was ordered to make a pre-sentence investigation of the pair.

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State Dairy Group Eyed

PORTLAND, (AP)—A state-wide dairy industry organization with a full time executive secretary has been proposed for Oregon.

At a committee meeting of industry leaders here Saturday, the new organization was suggested to permit a more aggressive program in public relations and legislative fields.

The program would be financed by the present one-cent a pound levy on butterfat sold in May and June, plus funds to be asked from dairy manufacturers and processors.

The present levy, which the committee estimated would raise about \$100,000 next year, is now used in part to employ Oscar Hag as a dairy marketing specialist on the Oregon State college extension staff.
