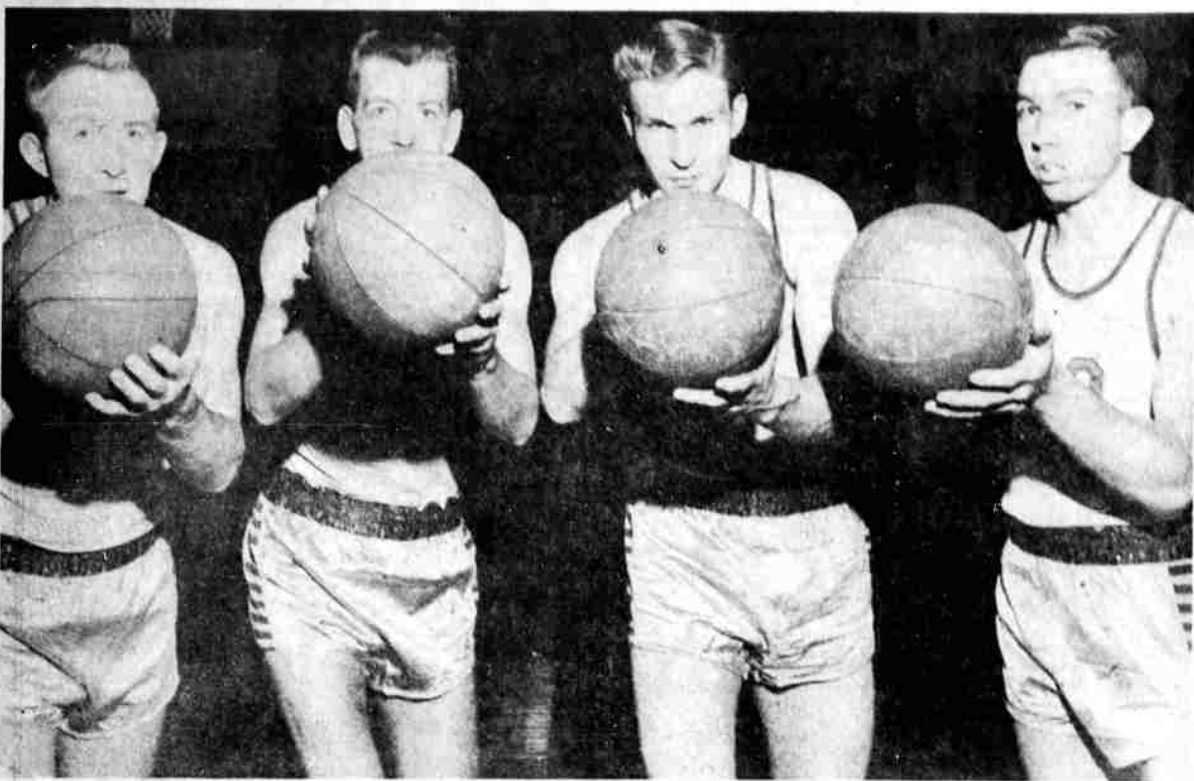

Owlies Open Cage Wars Here Friday

Oregon Tech pries the lid off an ambitious 27-game basketball schedule Friday night on its own mile-high court in the first of a two-night stand against Lassen Junior college of Susanville, Calif. Tip-off time both nights is 8 o'clock.

On the starting line will be veteran guards Don Sutphin and Marv Hammiack and forwards Homer Duncan and Jack Pinkley. Earning an opening nod to work with the Big Four is Wayne Holz, all-state star from Lebanon, who gets the call at center.

Sutphin is the lad who last year established an OCC single-game record of 34 points, finished with 226 points in league play, second high in the loop. Duncan's 186 gave him a third spot in OCC spring while Ham-

miack's 125 put Marv in the top twelve. All four of the lettermen hail from Myrtle Creek. John Koch, Grants Pass, is making a strong bid for Holz's pivot job. Others who will probably see action in the Lassen series include Al Foreman, last year's Jaycee speedster; Jim Paterson, St. Helens; Mel Brown, Grants Pass; Tom Humphrey, Marshfield; Jim McGregor, Yreka; Larry Terlisner, Bend; Keith Thompson, Phoenix; Len Genetin, Amsterdam, O.; John Henslee, Pilot Rock, and Jim Grossman, Ashland.

Hot Stove Warms Up With 8-Player Trade

NEW YORK, (AP)—Baseball's hot stove league has begun to show signs of life now that the college football season is nearly ended.

Those two live wire magnates, Frank Lane of the Chicago White Sox and Bill Veeck of the St. Louis Browns, stirred up the fires in the battered stove yesterday with an eight-man deal.

The White Sox shipped first baseman Gordon Goldsberry, outfielder Jim Rivera, pitcher Dick Littlefield, catcher Gus Niarhos and infielder Joe DeMaestri to the Browns for catcher Sherm Lollar, pitcher Al Widmar and shortstop Tommy Upton. Later, the White Sox traded Upton to the Washington Senators for infielder Sam Dente.

Lollar, also sought by the Boston Red Sox, was the man the White Sox wanted most. Lane intimated that the hard-hitting Lollar would greatly boost Chicago's chances of improving on its fourth place finish last season.

The Browns were happy to get Rivera, the Pacific Coast league's most valuable player. Rivera played for Brownie Manager Rogers Hornsby at Seattle last year.

Hornsby said, "He's the only player in all baseball today that I'd buy a \$2.00 box seat to watch play."

NO SURPRISE
St. Louis' acquisition of Rivera was not exactly a surprise. During the season it was rumored that Rivera was part of a deal that saw the Browns sell outfielder Ray Coleman to Chicago for the waiver price. The Sox had purchased

Rivera from Seattle for spring delivery.

Others figuring in the baseball news yesterday included Lefty O'Doul, Marty Marion and Fred Saigh.

O'Doul, former National league batting champion, was signed to manage San Diego of the Pacific Coast league. O'Doul, manager of San Francisco for the past 17 seasons, replaces former Detroit Tiger Manager Del Baker at the Padre helm.

EYES OFFERS
Marion, released as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals this week, was considering player-coach offers from the Browns and Boston Braves. The former star shortstop said he expected to make up his mind soon.

Saigh, owner of the Cardinals, said the search for a new manager had narrowed to three men, two of them from outside the Cardinal organization. One of the prospects reportedly is Ed Stanky, second baseman of the New York Giants. The man in the organization is either Card coach Terry Moore or Johnny Keane, manager of the Red Birds Columbus American Association team.

Drake Quits League Over Bright Case

DES MOINES, (AP)—Drake university ended its 43-year-old Missouri Valley conference membership last night, and Bradley university quickly indicated it may follow suit.

The Drake athletic council said it took its action because of the "refusal of the conference to investigate" the assault upon John Bright in the Drake-Oklahoma A. & M. football game at Stillwater, October 20.

Bright suffered a broken jaw in the early minutes of the game, which Oklahoma A. & M. won, 27-14. Drake officials after viewing pictures of the game charged Bright was the victim of at least three "vicious and premeditated" attacks by Aggie guard Wilbanks Smith.

Drake in its action last night also cut off athletic relations with Oklahoma A. & M., effective "at once." The council said it was asking Aggie officials to cancel contracts for two basketball games between the two schools this season.

Pres. David Owen of Bradley said at Peoria, Ill., he would recommend to his faculty athletic committee that it follow Drake's lead in withdrawing from the conference. The committee meets today.

Tate, Roffler Named AP's Backs of Week

NEW YORK, (AP)—Bill Tate, Illinois, and Bud Roffler, Washington State, were picked today as the Backs of the Week in the Associated Press poll.

Tate earned the offensive nod for his yeoman work in bucking the Northwestern line. Roffler, although he played the full 60 minutes against Washington, got the defensive laurels.

Tate, Illinois fullback, cracked the Northwestern line for 167 yards in 31 carries. His work constantly kept

Northwestern bottled up and paved the way for the Illinois field goal that won the game and a trip to the Rose Bowl.

SCORED TWO
Roffler, in sparking Washington State to a 27-25 victory over Washington, called the defensive signals. Twice he intercepted passes for returns of 26 and 31 yards. In addition, he did state's punting, carried the ball 31 times for 132 yards and passed for 77 more. He topped off a tremendous afternoon by scoring two touchdowns.

Hank Lauricella, Tennessee halfback, earned wide recognition for his fine work against Kentucky. He passed for one touchdown and set up two others by kicking the pylon 17 times for 123 yards.

IN AUBURN'S HALL
Billy Hair lived up to his name for Clemson. He was in Auburn's hall all the game in Clemson's 34-0 win. He tried 26 forward passes and completed 15 for 184 yards and two touchdowns. None were intercepted. His punting, two of which rolled out of bounds inside the Auburn five, and his broken field running also were standouts.

Other backs praised included: Jerry Norton, Southern Methodist; Ray McKown, Texas Christian; Babe Parilli, Kentucky; Mel Roach, Virginia; Ollie Matson, San Francisco; and Chuck Spaulding, Wyoming.

Clemson, Miami In Gator Bowl

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—The Clemson Tigers and the Miami Hurricanes will renew their post-season football rivalry in the Gator Bowl here New Year's Day.

Clemson defeated Miami, 15-14, in the Orange Bowl at Miami last Jan. 1. Selection of the South Carolina college to oppose the South Florida school was announced Tuesday by Pres. Sam Wolfson of the Gator Bowl association. Wolfson said Clemson officials decided to come here for the seventh Gator Bowl game despite Southern Conference disapproval.

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
