

Billie Burke, Now in Video, Defends the Low-Cut Gowns

 HOLLYWOOD.—Billie Burke, now a full-time television star, today defended the gals who wear low-cut gowns on TV.
 "My goodness," exclaimed the distinguished actress, "isn't the secret of beauty in how to reveal and how to conceal? If a girl has something worth revealing, I don't see why she shouldn't do so, as long as she leaves something to the imagination."
 "After all, there is considerable historical basis for the use of décolletage. In the 17th and 18th century, the ladies certainly went in for plunging necklines, both on the stage and off. Lillian Russell was slightly before my time in the theater, but I can recall seeing her with very low-cut gowns. She was typical of that era. The women

may have worn plenty of skirts, but they were certainly skimpier above."

 Miss Burke also cited her late husband, the great showman Florenz Ziegfeld.
 "Mr. Ziegfeld certainly knew the value of revealing the female figure," she remarked, "although I must say that as his career progressed the girls in his shows wore more than they did in his earlier days."
 I talked to Miss Burke at her television show, where the technicians were kidding calling her "Faye Emerson." It seems she had worn a fairly low-cut dress that day "quite by mistake." She primly applied a covering of lace before air time.
 The actress had embarked on a gruelling TV schedule which precludes her return to the stage or screen. She does a half-hour, five-times-a-week interview and comment show over KTTV. She arrives at the station around 11 in the morning and works straight through until the show is off the air at 4:30. I asked how she decided on such heavy work.
 "I had done some guest appearances in New York," she said, "but that didn't seem to be the thing for me. At first I thought I might do a program of my reminiscences, but I realized that can be deadly. So we came up with the idea of just playing myself at home and having guests to interview."
 "I must admit I was terrified at first. I was completely at a loss on the first show and had the frightening feeling of what am I doing here? I think most actors are out of their element when they are required to speak by themselves, after having relied all their lives on lines that were written for them. Why, when I started out on the stage, my producer would not even allow me to speak at luncheons and he tried to keep me from talking to the press."

Historical Records To Go To Salem

SALEM, (P)—The state board of control told the Oregon historical society to give the state back some 15,000 precious records of Oregon's provisional and territorial governments.
 These records, going back before 1859 when Oregon became a state, were loaned to the society in 1931 because the state didn't have a safe place to keep them. It was a good thing, too, because the capitol burned in 1935, and the records would have been destroyed.
 But now that the state has fireproof vaults in the new state buildings in Salem, the board of control thinks the records should be kept here.
 Board members said the records now are being kept in the second floor of the public auditorium in Portland. They said the quarters are not fireproof, and that the public doesn't have any access to the records.
 The board will place them in a fireproof vault in the capitol, where they will be readily available to persons who need to refer to them.
 The board hopes eventually to find a place where the most interesting records can be put on public display.
 The request to return the records to Salem was made by Brian Goodenough, Salem attorney who worked for the state supreme court for 25 years as bailiff and code commissioner.
 Goodenough said that on many occasions he had needed to refer to the records, but he couldn't get them because they were in Portland.
