

Klamath Ministers Speak Opposition To Vatican Appointment At Meeting

A near-capacity crowd at the First Methodist church here last night appeared unanimously against the idea of sending a U.S. ambassador to the Vatican. However, the several participants in a roundtable discussion couldn't agree as to why they objected.

Occasion was a public forum sponsored by the Klamath Ministerial Assoc. Most of the city's leading Protestant ministers were featured in short talks and took part in the open forum period.

Several ministers strove to keep the meeting on the theme of Christian policy and out of the ken of anti-Catholicism.

But in the closing minutes of the session, an unidentified layman flatly said he opposed the Vatican ambassadorship "because we are

against the Catholics in everything from top to bottom, right down the line" and his remarks were greeted with the loudest applause of the evening.

Earlier, several of the ministers had declared their objections were based solely on the policies of church-state separation and the upholding of the U.S. constitution.

The Rev. George Alder, who served as moderator, said he felt he was speaking for all the ministers when he said the pastors were not opposing the Vatican ambassadorship solely on the grounds of anti-Catholicism. Ministers seated behind Alder nodded their assent.

The Rev. Edwin Landers took personal exception to the anti-Catholic view, dubbing it "un-Christian."

The Rev. Lloyd Holloway went further. He said he feared Vatican recognition would work a hardship on Catholic clergymen in this country "because they might have to be registered as alien representatives of a foreign power."

The Rev. David Barnett Jr., reading from the Bill of Rights and supreme court decisions, held creation of a Vatican ambassadorship would be unconstitutional.

Other ministers participating included Revs. Irvin Tweed, P. C. Alderson and Donald Cassidy.

At the meeting's close, postal cards were passed out and members of the audience were asked to register their objections by mailing the cards to their U.S. senators.

Pres. Truman's nomination of Gen. Mark Clark as this nation's first full ambassador to the Vatican awaits senate approval or rejection.

Ship Fires At Navy Plane

WASHINGTON, 18—The navy reported today one of its patrol planes was fired on by a wooden vessel about 50 miles east of the Southern China port of Swatow.

Brief reports received here said the American plane was not hit by some 50 rounds of machinegun fire at a range of about 2000 yards.

Swatow is near the southern end of the Formosa strait, which has been patrolled by the navy since the start of hostilities in Korea.

The report described the otherwise unidentified surface craft as a wooden lugger.

The navy also reported one of its attack planes slightly damaged when two Red MIG-15 fighters jumped a navy flight on the northeast coast of Korea yesterday.

A spokesman said this was the first time enemy planes had appeared in this sector.

Three navy planes were reported lost yesterday, one to enemy ground fire and two as a result of operational accidents.

Secret Agent Tells Of Reds

BOSTON, 18—Herbert A. Philbrick, 36, former FBI undercover agent in the Communist party, said last night "it is impossible for anyone, no matter how clever, to work with the Communist party and not be used for the best interests of the Soviet Union."

The Cambridge advertising executive spoke at a dinner given by a Boston American legion post in honor of his work for the government.

More than 800 persons attended the dinner at which Secretary of State Edward J. Cronin presented Philbrick with the commonwealth scroll of appreciation.

Governor Paul A. Dever had proclaimed the day as "Herbert A. Philbrick Day."

Philbrick said "I was fortunate to have been pulled out of the Communist ranks to testify against the 11 Communist leaders who were convicted in Judge (Harold R.) Medina's New York court. I want to accept this honor as symbolic of gratitude to the others who are left in the Communist ranks as undercover agents."

The governor's proclamation said of Philbrick "He kept the FBI constantly informed of the treasonable activities of the enemy's fifth column. The fight for freedom will be won if we remain vigilant and unafraid."

Non-Support Trial Slated Thursday

Trial of Jack Herwick, indicted for non-support of three minor children, is scheduled to open in circuit court Thursday.

Herwick, free on \$2000 bail, is defended by Attorney George Proctor. The complaint was brought against him by his ex-wife, Vivian, from whom he was divorced July 12, 1950. Herwick was supposed to have paid \$42 a month support for each of the three children.

Johnson Guilty On Check Charge

A verdict of guilty was reached in about 20 minutes yesterday afternoon in the circuit court trial of David C. Johnson, 36, indicted for obtaining money by false pretenses.

He was convicted of passing an \$8.75 bad check at Berg's Texaco service station.

The trial lasted two days. Johnson is to be sentenced at 10 a.m. Thursday.
