## Market Features Wheat Strength

CHICAGO, (AP)—Strength in December and March wheat, both of which went to new seasonal highs, featured a somewhat erratic market on the board of trade today.

December and March wheat sold at virtually the same price, which compared with a 1 1/2-cent premium for March at yesterday's finish. Both were at the best price for any wheat future since February, 1948. Export houses again were buyers.

Trading in other cereals was active. The deferred wheat contracts were found most of the session despite the upward move of December and March.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 2 1/2 higher, December \$2.67 1/4, corn 1/4 lower, December \$1.89 1/4-1.89, oats 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, December 98 1/4-99, rye (new style) 1/4-1/2 higher, December \$2.01, soybeans 1/2 to 2 1/2 higher, January \$3.00, and lard 18 to 37 cents a hundred pounds higher, December \$16.10-16.12.

## Market's Gain, Losses Mixed

NEW YORK, (AP)—Prices turned to a fairly even mixture of gains and losses during late trading on the stock exchange today.

Most of the price changes were measured in fractions and activity was less than the volume running to \$1,000,000.

The steadiness of the early session drifted away during the interruption and for the remainder of the trading selling chipped away at the fractional gains.

The domestic news was all to the good but traders were puzzled and cautious after looking over foreign developments.

At home soft industries began to show a strength, dangerous inventories were pared down and there were some encouraging dividends.

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# Dairymen Plan Program

SALEM, (AP)—A proposed statewide organization to carry on a united public relations program for the dairy industry, will be the subject of a dairy industry meeting to be called soon.

That was the report yesterday of Fred Knox, association president. He told the Oregon farm bureau federation convention here that the proposed program involves financial support from both producers and processors.

# Welch Admits Assault Guilt

Bert Welch, 32-year-old railroad worker, scheduled to stand trial Monday on charge of statutory rape, had a change of heart this morning in circuit court before Judge David R. Vandenberg and entered a plea of guilty.

Married, and a father of six children, Welch was accused of being intimate with a 15-year-old girl, telling her he was divorced.

He was arrested July 14 on a complaint signed by the girl's mother and held in the county jail under \$5000 bond.

EARLY PLEA  
Welch had previously entered a plea of innocence to this charge in court November 1. He was represented by R. F. McLaren, appointed as attorney for the defendant by the court.

Welch will be sentenced Saturday morning by Judge Vandenberg.

Also scheduled for appearance Saturday morning are George Boehmer, 38, and Manuella Forrest, 32.

Boehmer is scheduled to enter a plea to charge of larceny in store. Mrs. Forrest is charged with burglary, not in a dwelling, and will also enter a plea.

Boehmer was arrested May 14 on charge of stealing a suitcase from J. C. Penney Co. He has been in the county jail since that time and been indicted twice by the grand jury on the charge.

Mrs. Forrest is accused of breaking a window in Murphy's Seed store, 834 Klamath, November 17, and stealing 36 worth of ceramics from the store window.

In other circuit court action, Marvin Lee Couner, 28, charged with non-support of a minor child, entered a plea of guilty.
