Slide Blocks 101 Near Eureka

EUREKA, Calif. (AP)—An avalanche of rocks, mud and trees rumbled down a mountainside last night blocking U. S. highway 101 south of here for several hours.

State highway maintenance crews had the important north-south highway opened by 4 a.m.

The slide piled debris 10 feet high along 40 feet of the highway. Sheriff Charles Raab said "rocks as big as a house" blocked 101 and it looked as if a "whole mountain" had moved over.

The tons of rain-soaked earth and rock halted cars bumper-to-bumper more than a mile.

The spot is three miles south of Pepperwood, where the highway passes between the mountain on the west and the Eel river on the east.
