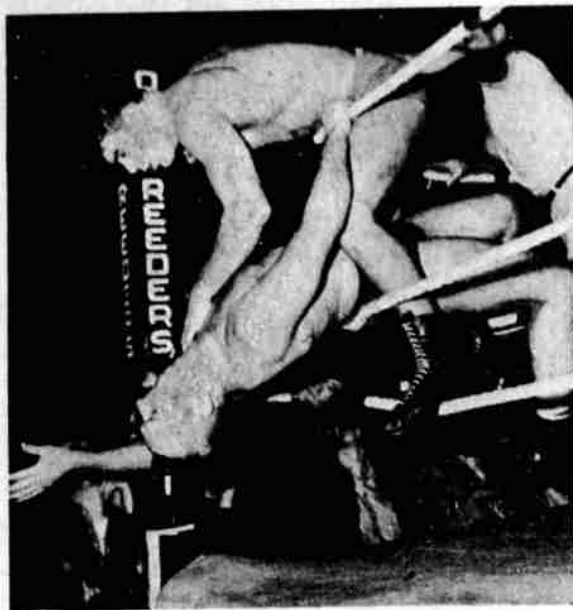

Tremaine Wins When Dusette Hurts Ankle

Wrestling fans today are hailing their long-time favorite, Georges Dusette, as the "uncrowned light heavyweight champion."

Dusette didn't beat champion Andy Tremaine in a non-title bout—probably the best seen here in a flock of Wednesdays—but only a freak accident prevented the French-Canadian Strongman from at least gaining a draw, maybe a win.

It was Dusette's strength against Tremaine's speed—and the edge had to go to Dusette at the time of the mishap—just seven and a half minutes before the end of the one-hour bout.

TWISTS ANKLE
Angered at Tremaine's capricious way of breaking holds, Dusette hung a hard right hand on Tremaine's chin. But in so doing, Dusette twisted his ankle when the sole of his wrestling shoe stuck to the mat.

Dusette dropped like a stuck pig, writhing in pain. Tremaine closed in for the kill, but Referee Bob DeMarce kept the champion away until he could check Dusette's ankle injury.

Tiring of fighting off the El Paso mat king, the referee gave the first fall to Dusette.

SOFT TOUCH
But, hobbling on his lame leg when he shouldn't have been in the ring at all, Dusette was a soft touch for Tremaine who rushed in at the second bell to pole-axe Dusette with two shoulder butts and finish him off with the rip-saw headlock.

Dusette had had enough. He couldn't even stand on the gimp leg.

Up to the end, Tremaine's famed shoulder butts were not working against stout Dusette. The stocky Canadian spent most of the 52 minutes, 30 seconds—until the time of the injury—tossing Tremaine around like a rag doll.

But Tremaine's speed showed when he escaped Dusette's full Nelson repeatedly.

Red Sox Return Les Moss

BOSTON, (P)—By marking off an estimated \$100,000 cash outlay, the Boston Red Sox today were rid of Les Moss, their most disappointing catching investment, after gaining an eighth outfielder of major league caliber.

Moss, obtained from the St. Louis Browns last June for that huge sum plus Matt Batts, another backstop, was sent back to his old club, along with Tom Wright, a rookie outfielder. In return the Red Sox received Gus Niarhos, the slightly built catcher, and Ken Wood, an exceptionally strong-armed outfielder.

Playing in 71 games, Moss batted a feeble .198, thereby convincing new manager Lou Boudreau that catching was the club's most troublesome 1952 problem. Wright spent most of the past season with the Louisville American Association farm club.

Niarhos was one of five players the White Sox gave St. Louis' trade-minded Bill Veck for Sherm Lollar, a catcher the Red Sox desire greatly, pitcher Al Widmar, a 1946 Boston discard, and shortstop Tom Upton.

Stanky Deal Looks Certain

Eddie May Head Cardinals

NEW YORK, (P)—Eddie Stanky virtually is certain of succeeding Marty Marion as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals.

No definite agreement has been reached as yet, but Presidents Horace Stoneham of the New York Giants and Fred M. Saigh of the Cardinals will meet within the next few days with the hope of closing the deal, brewing since the World Series.

The transaction may not be announced until the minor league convention in Columbus next week.

TRADE
The Cards will be asked to turn over pitcher Max Lanier and outfielder Chuck Diering for Stanky, who will then sign as a player-manager with the Redbirds for a two-year contract at \$35,000 per season.

Although Saigh has been quoted as saying that he had three men in mind or the job, he has not seriously considered anybody other than Stanky.

It was only a question whether Stoneham was willing to part with the Giants' scrappy second baseman, admittedly the inspirational spark who drove the team to the National league flag last season.

Stoneham is loathe to lose the brash "quarterback" of his infield, but is agreeable to the transaction only because he does not want to be accused of "blocking Stanky's chance of realizing his dream"—managing a big league club.

Saigh, who had rejected an earlier New York request for Enos Slaughter and Harry Brecheen, is equally reluctant to part with Lanier. Finally convinced, however, the Giants won't back down on their latest demand, the Redbird boss is ready to give up his veteran southpaw.
