There is now an extensive library of men and women suitors in Hampe's "Marriage-Sound-Film-Studio." A customer comes in, says he'd like to meet a nice lady and he is ushered to a seat.

It's all done in complete privacy. He is shown films of ladies until he finds one he likes. He can window-shop this way without embarrassment. He sees what the merchandise looks like, what it sounds like and then, if he wants, he can say, "OK, wrap it up."

Occasionally, a client can't find anything that he likes. When he reaches the point that he says, "This is where I came in," Hampe just turns the camera on him and adds him to the library.

The unique system is patented, and Hampe plans to extend it all over Germany. Eventually, he hopes to exchange films with similar institutions all over the world.

Baton Battle Delays Show

CHICAGO (AP)—The orchestra for the opera "Carmen" walked out of the pit last night at the bid of James Petrillo, musician's union boss, who decided the orchestra's dignity had been bruised. The performance was delayed 15 minutes.

Petrillo said Alfred Bruening, New York violinist, and concertmaster of the orchestra, had complained that after the New York City Opera Co.'s performance of "Madame Butterfly" last Saturday, he was hit by a baton thrown by Laszlo Halasz, the conductor and music director.

Halasz allegedly acted in a moment of pique expressing his displeasure with the orchestra's performance, Petrillo said.

Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, appeared at the opera at the civic opera house last night, called the musicians from the pit and said they would remain out until Halasz apologized.

The orchestra returned after 25 minutes, with one report stating Halasz had made an apology and the matter was straitened out.

But Halasz later told a reporter, "I made no apology. I told Mr. Petrillo that I had hit Mr. Bruening with a baton. I would have apologized immediately, but since I did not hit him I did not see any need for apologizing."

NO BATON

Halasz, however, said he would not use a baton in future conducting.

"Tomorrow, (Friday) I make my debut at Milwaukee without a baton. I shall conduct with my hands only, so that no one shall accuse me of throwing a baton," he said.

The conductor also struck a note of hurt surprise at Bruening's charge.

"To think," he said, "such a thing from a man whom I myself elevated several weeks ago to his present position from the very last stand in the orchestra."

Bad Man Cook Sentenced To Death in California

EL CENTRO (AP)—The criminal savagery of William Edward Cook, a 23-year-old pint sized desperado who kidnaped nine persons and killed six of them, has been halted by California justice.

Cook, product of wretched environment in a bleak and desolate abandoned mining section near Joplin, Mo., was sentenced yesterday to death in San Quentin gas chamber for the murder of a Seattle oil salesman, Robert H. Dewey.

The five-foot, four-inch self-styled badman already was under five sentences of 60 years each in connection with the kidnap-murders of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Mosser and their three children of Astwood, Ill. The sentences were to be served consecutively.

TRANSFER

The federal director of prisons, James V. Bennett, may now order the transfer of Cook from the federal prison at Alcatraz Island to California's San Quentin, where the state will await action of the state supreme court on his appeal for a review, automatic under California law.

If no reversible error is found by the high court, the federal authorities then may surrender technical custody, so that Cook may pay the supreme penalty. The department of justice said in Washington that the attorney general will await receipt of formal papers before transferring Cook to California's jurisdiction.

Under public document 98, passed by congress and signed by the president last summer, Cook would have been eligible for parole from Alcatraz prison after serving only 15 years of his 300-year sentence, **BRAND**

Superior Judge Luray J. Mouser said he found no extenuating circumstances in his study of trial testimony or of the transcript of grand jury testimony that was made available to him by stipulation. He branded the killing of Dewey as premeditated and deliberate and said it was coupled with the perpetration of a felony, the robbery of Dewey.

Cook twice uttered feeble, almost inaudible "no's" when the court asked him if he had anything to say before sentence was pronounced. He showed no visible emotion as the court ordered the death penalty, but as soon as it was delivered two of the 10 husky guards inside the court railing pounced upon him and clamped on handcuffs.
