

Committee Puts City Near Water Fluoriding

Fluoridation of city water for tooth decay prevention will probably be like the flowers in Klamath Falls . . . blossom forth in the spring.

That was the opinion of two doctors, three dentists, one city councilman and one newspaper reporter who comprised a "public meeting" last night at the county health department, on the issue of adopting fluoridation in Klamath Falls.

Despite the smallness of the crowd, the mayor-appointed committee member . . . Oregon Water Corp. official, Glenn Bowen, was unable to attend . . . took a fair sized whack at cutting red tape binding the introduction of fluoridation here.

So the situation now stands like this:

1. A report of a recent water mineral analysis will be sent to the Oregon State board of health.
2. Written approval of the local health officer, the county dental and medical societies has been obtained.
3. Popular demand for adoption of fluoridation has been evidenced by letters to the city council from YTA groups, the Red Cross and other city groups.
4. Preliminary application for adoption of fluoridation will be made to the state board of health by Dr. Beth Kerrom, secretary of the fluoridation committee.
5. When preliminary approval is granted the city council will have

to adopt an ordinance favoring fluoridation. The ordinance—since not construable as an emergency measure—will go through a three-week process, enabling usuring time for any pro or con argument.

In the meantime members of the dental society will make a survey of tooth decay in children of the first three grades in all city schools.

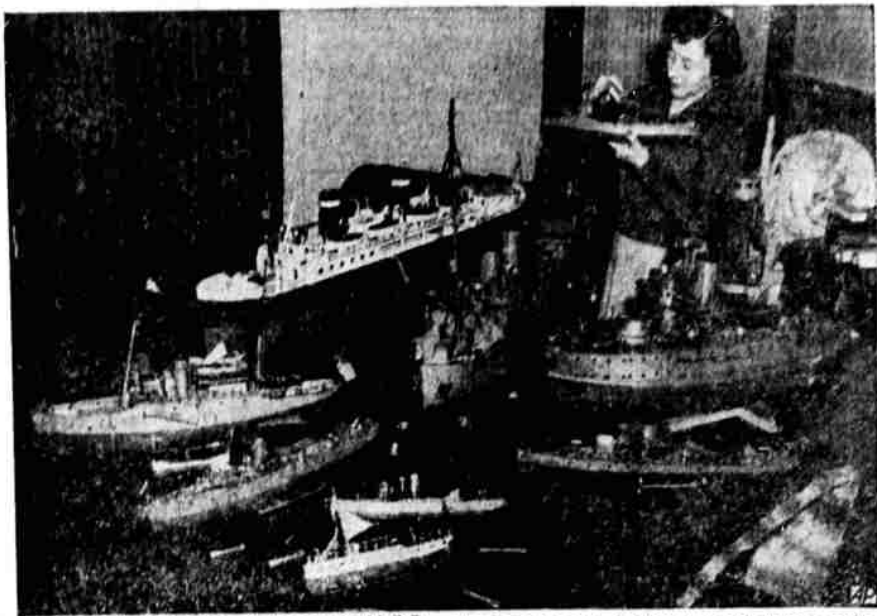
This will enable a measuring guide of the results of fluoridation if it is adopted—in about five or six years.

Meanwhile, in Washington D. C. yesterday, after a study of the pros and cons, a special committee of the national research council has concluded that the addition of certain chemicals to drinking water can help reduce tooth decay.

In endorsing the fluoridation of public water supplies, however, the committee said it should be done only under expert dental and engineering supervision by state boards of health. "The local meeting last night was of the same opinion, and also stated the process should be well supervised by skilled personnel."

Report made by the national group last night said the safety of fluoridation depended on proper controls. It also said that its effectiveness depends on proper selection of water supplies to be treated.

Because of the controversy over the matter, the committee was appointed last spring to make a study. Its parent body, the national research council, is a federation of scientific societies chartered by congress.

Spud Ceilings Possible; NW Prices Near Parity

Potatoes and other fresh vegetables are presently exempt from price ceilings, but ceilings can be placed on them when they reach parity.

Sam Anderson, Newell rancher and potato grower, returned last week from Washington, D. C., where conferences were underway on possible setting of ceilings on spuds.

According to Anderson, a ceiling would not hurt the present potato prices.

OSC Economist Marion Thomas, also back from agricultural conferences in Washington, reported this week that ceilings could be imposed on an area basis before the national farm price for potatoes reaches parity. But whether or not this will be done has not yet been decided.

Thomas was told that Northwest potato prices are nearing parity minimums at which the ceilings could be applied. This is despite the fact national average prices were still well below parity last month.

Anderson reported the National Potato Council is meeting in Washington deciding on recommendations on price ceilings for OPs, and will also null over the Branban farm bill.

Morse May Aid Homeless Man

SALEM, (P)—Sen. Wayne Morse will attempt to delay the deportation of a 24-year-old Romanian who contends he has spent the last four years wandering the world to find a country that will admit him.

The Romanian, Stephen Darie, said he left his homeland when the Communists came into power. He stowed away on a ship which arrived in Portland last week. Immigration officials have refused him entry into the U. S.

Morse said he will ask his office assistant in Washington to attempt to delay Darie's departure until the case is investigated.

MMA Assistant Due December 1

PORTLAND, (P)—W. S. Weidel of Los Angeles, will become assistant state milk marketing administrator December 1.

That was announced here Saturday by Fred Cockell, Milwaukee, chairman of the state board of agriculture.

Cockell said Weidel had accepted the appointment with the understanding that he would become administrator next year when Thomas L. Ohlsen resigns.

Ohlsen, who is beyond the 65 year retirement age, recently was granted a one year extension on his job by the state civil service commission.

Weidel is a field man for the bureau of milk control, California state department of agriculture.

Arrangements may be made through the county extension office, postoffice building, where order blanks are available.

Farm Trees Available

Trees for planting on farms are available by order from the Oregon forest nursery.

Some 20 species of trees, both conifer and broadleaf, are available at a small price per thousand plants—most in the seedling stage.

To be eligible, however, the tree buyer must hold at least three acres of land in a single unit at the place where they are to be planted.

NATO to Aid Flood Area

ROME, (P)—The 11 cities and villages that have been hardest hit by Italy's greatest flood in modern history will be rebuilt by the 11 nations that with Italy comprise the North Atlantic treaty organizations.

Representatives of the nations—Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Iceland, Norway, Portugal, the United Kingdom, the United States and Italy—yesterday concluded their eighth NATO council sessions here.

Giuseppe Spataro, Italian minister of posts and communications, announced the NATO nations' offer and asked Italy's civil engineers to name the cities and towns.

Floodwaters of the Po river and its tributaries that ravaged rich agricultural lands of the Po delta area and Rovigo province during the past three weeks continued to recede today.

French, American and British army headquarters worked alongside Italian army engineers in setting up communications and other reconstruction.

SHIPWRECK SUIT

PORTLAND, (P)—The explosion of the freighter George Walton resulted in loss of their pay, crew members of the ship claimed Wednesday in a suit filed here. Eleven crew members are suing the Pacific-Atlantic Steamship Co. for one month's wages. They said in the suit that the ship was not in a seaworthy condition at the time of the explosion, and that when they were forced to abandon it, they lost a month's work and pay.

PETERBOROUGH, N. H.—Three registered Guernsey cows, owned by Dr. F. C. Adams, Klamath Falls, Oregon, have omitted the official advanced registry to the American Guernsey cattle club for approval and publication.

On twice daily milking for a 10-month period, Adamsdale Frolic's Fancy, a junior two-year-old, produced 8522 pounds of milk and 456 pounds of butterfat.

Adamsdale Norman's Bonnie produced 9009 pounds of milk and 528 pounds of butterfat on twice daily milking for a 10-month period as a junior two-year-old.

On twice daily milking for a 10-month period, Adamsdale Lena's Lilac, a junior two-year-old, produced 7638 pounds of milk and 412 pounds of butterfat.

"Fancy," "Bonnie" and "Lilac" are the daughters of the registered Guernsey sire, Adamsdale Norman, that has three daughters in the performance register of the American Guernsey cattle club.
